CALL TO ORDER

The adjourned regular meeting of the Irvine City Council was called to order at 5:51 p.m. on July 12, 2022, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, 1 Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor Khan presiding.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

City Manager Chi provided a brief status update on the City's audit of the Orange County Power Authority (OCPA), noting that the City had recently received information from the OCPA to begin conducting the audit, and that the City has engaged a firm to audit all pre-launch costs that have been expended by OCPA to confirm that the expenditures are consistent with the terms of the agreement that the City entered into; and that it is anticipated that the audit will be completed within the next couple of months. He also noted that interested residents who contact City staff are referred to the OCPA directly.

ANNOUNCEMENTS/COMMITTEE REPORTS/COUNCIL REPORTS

Mayor Khan:

- At the last Orange County Power Authority (OCPA) meeting, the Board was presented with its first fiscal year of operations data, which exceeded original expectations, and the OCPA expects a strong fiscal year ahead for 2022-23. Based on this data, Mayor Khan presented a check to the City of Irvine in the amount of \$250,000 from OCPA, which represented partial loan and interest toward the capital loan made to the OCPA by the City of Irvine, which was made four years in advance of its January, 2027, due date; and as efforts continue to grow OCPA, it is anticipated that additional payments will be forthcoming. Interested individuals can obtain additional information on the OCPA website at ocpower.org. A call center is also available for any questions or assistance.
- Mayor Khan congratulated Kristine Yada, Beckman High School student who received her Master's Degree in nutrition science from California State University, Long Beach, for being selected as 2022 Nisei Week Queen at the Aratani Theatre in Little Tokyo.
- The City recently received a Beacon Leadership and Innovation Award from the Institute for Local Government for its work on the Recycle From Home pilot program, which gives all residents access to convenient, in-home recycling services. This prestigious award recognizes equity and engagement in sustainability and climate. In partnership with the state agency CalRecycle, Irvine has helped facilitate the Recycle From Home pilot program. CalRecycle provided funding for the program, which is Irvine's authorized recycling pilot vendor, and the City support and promotes the program. For those not familiar with Recycle From Home, customers follow a few simple steps of sorting and preparing their CA-CRV recyclable items and schedule pickups online at recyclefromhome.com. Recyclables are picked up, weighed, and processed. Redemption is calculated for payment to residents electronically or as a mailed check.
- Last week, the City was recognized by the California Association of Public Information Officers for the Irvine Global Village Festival, which has been the City's premier event for the past 21 years. City staff received the EPIC Award for Recurring Special or Community Event at the association's annual conference. The statewide association recognized the annual staff-produced event as an outstanding effort that serves as an inspiration for public outreach. There were six finalists in the combined 2020/2021 annual awards, and the Irvine Global Village Festival was the only EPIC Award recipient in its category for the two years. This year's Irvine Global Village Festival will be held on October 8 at Great Park. For information, visit irvinefestival.org.

- The City received the Achievement of Excellence in Procurement Award from the National Procurement Institute for the 17th consecutive year. This award recognizes the City's Purchasing team's innovation, professionalism, productivity, and leadership in its commitment to acquiring quality goods and services at the best value to the City. The Purchasing Team has been dedicated to conducting outreach and education to disadvantaged businesses interested in contracting with the City. Through their efforts, the City has increased the number of women-owned and minority-owned companies notified of budding opportunities, and awarded over \$2 million to these businesses in 2021. Vice Mayor Kuo:

- On Wednesday, September 14 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., join Assemblymember and former Irvine Mayor Steven Choi at his mobile office hours at Heritage Park Library, located at Walnut and Yale. Assemblymember Choi and his staff will be on hand to provide a legislative update from one of three elected representatives in the State Legislature in Sacramento.
- The Irvine Swim League will be hosting its first annual Texas Hold'em Fundraiser at Strawberry Farms Golf Course on Friday, September 23. Tickets begin at \$150 and go up to sponsorships at \$10,000. Twenty-two local teams are part of the Irvine Swim League. For inquiries, email director@irvineswimleague.org.
- Last week, the Irvine Community Land Trust was honored with a Special Needs award from the Kennedy Commission, a community based non-profit working to increase the production of homes for lower-income households (Salerno Apartment Community). Of the 80 units at Salerno, 35 are set aside for special needs populations including veterans and their families, adults with intellectual and/or physical disabilities, and families at risk of homelessness.
- Last week, Vice Mayor Kuo attended the League of California Cities annual conference and expo, held in Long Beach. In addition to attending a seminar where Mayor Khan presented, he also participated in a seminar about public safety and possible proposed changes to Proposition 47. Additionally, he had the chance to exchange ideas with many of his colleagues from cities throughout the state.
- As the City's representative to the Orange County Sanitation District, Vice Mayor Kuo participated in a terrific presentation from Inside the Outdoors, a program of the Orange County Department of Education, for City Council information at an upcoming meeting.

- Vice Mayor Kuo and some of his colleagues attended the recent grand opening of H-Mart, a new grocery store in Westpark, located at the corner of Culver and Alton in the former Albertsons space. Some have asked why a line exists to enter, and others have asked when the Northpark location will be opening, which is anticipated around Thanksgiving.

ACTION:

2.5 BUDGET ADJUSTMENT ALLOCATING IRVINE RECOVERY PLAN FUNDS TO IRVINE CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILIES STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

ACTION:

Approved a budget adjustment for \$410,940 to allocate funds within the Irvine Recovery Plan Fund to the Irvine Children, Youth and Families Strategic Plan Update for Fiscal Years 2023-2028.

2.6 ACCEPTANCE OF CALIFORNIA OFFICE OF TRAFFIC SAFETY SELECTIVE TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM (STEP) GRANT AND CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY PROGRAM GRANT

ACTION:

3. PUBLIC HEARINGS

3.1 ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING AN EXPEDITED PERMITTING PROCESS FOR ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Mayor Khan, and unanimously carried to:

Continue the public hearing to September 27, 2022.

4. COUNCIL BUSINESS

4.1 AGREEMENTS FOR OUTSOURCED IT SERVICES AND OUTSOURCED CYBERSECURITY SERVICES

Nick Rykroft, Information Technology Specialist III, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Jim Bersig, Interim Chief Information Officer, was also available for questions.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about the relationship and integration between the two proposed vendors; questioned the security of Peraton's own infrastructure; inquired about the experience level of Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) related to cybersecurity; questioned the definition of "end user" and who it covered; inquired about potential levels of service based on different types of end users; questioned whether information technology (IT) services had been scaled for population; inquired about whether IT services were available for members of the public; and questioned whether higher pricing was anticipated in the future based on head count.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Vice Mayor Kuo, and unanimously carried to:

- 1) Approve and authorize the Mayor to execute a three-year agreement with Peraton State & Local Inc. for outsourced information technology services in the amount not-to-exceed \$18,319,734. **(Contract No. 20649)**
- 2) Approve and authorize the Mayor to execute a three-year agreement with Science Applications International Corporation for outsourced cybersecurity services in the amount not-to-exceed \$6,687,753. **(Contract No. 20651)**

4.2 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR KHAN FOR AN UPDATE ON THE CLIMATE ACTION AND ADAPTATION PLAN

This item was agendaized at the request of Mayor Khan, who asked for an update by staff on the Climate Action and Adaptation Plan (CAAP).

Oliver Chi, City Manager, and Jaimee Bourgeois, Director of Public Works and Transportation, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about active transportation measures currently underway, and suggested a presentation at an upcoming City Council meeting; expressed concern about hydrogen technology; suggested technologies that could be implemented right

away; clarified that the state's electric grid could handle electrification challenges; reiterated the need for renewable energy; referenced the Cool City Challenge; expressed concern about the recent flex alerts; noted that the state may not be importing clean energy; inquired about renewable options by 2030; suggested website updates on sustainable measures already taken, those underway, and future goals; inquired about whether federal funding was available for micro transit to build and subsidize fares; questioned provisions of the 2023 Building Codes and impacts on natural gas installations; suggested public outreach to limit natural gas installations; suggested investing in the City's transportation fleet and solarizing older homes; and suggested a monthly CAAP update to the City Council.

Received and filed. No action was taken.

4.3 *CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER KIM TO DISCUSS FUTURE PROOFING OUR ECONOMY AND ESTABLISHING IRVINE AS THE PREMIER BUSINESS FOUNDER/CREATOR IN ORANGE COUNTY*

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Kim, who asked for City Council consideration to future proof the City's economy and establishing Irvine as the premier business founder/creator in Orange County.

City Council discussion included: suggesting integration with the Innovation Council; inquired about an inventory of measures taken toward economic development; suggested a plan of action once an inventory is compiled; noted efforts made to date by the Innovation Council; noted the challenges of current rental rates; referenced the City's low business license fee in comparison to other cities; and noted the importance of business diversity.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Vice Mayor Kuo to:

Direct the City Manager and City staff, in partnership with Councilmember Kim and Mayor Khan, to develop within 45 days a new economic development strategy plan and associated programs to future proof the City's economy, and ensure that the City of Irvine serves as the premier location in Orange County for individuals who want to found and establish high-tech and future-focused business ventures over the next 50 years.

The motion carried as follows:

4.4 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER AGRAN TO DISCUSS INITIATION OF CONDEMNATION PROCEEDINGS AGAINST ALL AMERICAN ASPHALT

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Agran, who asked for City Council consideration to initiate condemnation proceedings against All American Asphalt.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about the action taken by the City Council at its meeting of August 9, 2022, with respect to All American Asphalt.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Agran to:

Direct the City Manager and City Attorney, with or without the assistance of special counsel, to return to the next City Council meeting of September 27, 2022, prepared to file the appropriate pleadings and otherwise prepare to initiate condemnation proceedings by October 5, 2022.

The motion failed for lack of second.

No action was taken.

4.5 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY VICE MAYOR KUO TO DISCUSS THE CHAMPIONSHIP SOCCER STADIUM AT GREAT PARK

This item was agendized at the request of Vice Mayor Kuo, who asked for City Council consideration to provide additional feedback and further direction to City staff relative to the Championship Soccer Stadium at Great Park.

City Council discussion included: noting the absence of a plan beyond the expiration of the existing Memorandum of Understanding (MOU); and suggested that City staff meet with Orange County Soccer Club (OCSC) representatives to OCSC's plan for next season, and return to the City Council for its consideration.

ACTION: Moved by Vice Mayor Kuo, seconded by Councilmember Kim, to:

Direct staff to enter into an agreement under the same parameters as the existing MOU with a one-year term beginning at the current expiration date in November, 2022, and expiring in November, 2023; and concurrently, enter into substantive discussions on what happens upon expiration of the one-year extension.

Additional City Council discussion included: noting unfriendly emails received from OCSC fans; reiterated the absence of backroom deals by City Councilmembers; inquired about when staff would return to the City Council for its approval; reiterated the need to also prioritize public use and availability; and inquired about whether the proposed one-year agreement would return to the City Council for consideration or be handled administratively by staff.

ACTION: A friendly amendment was made by Mayor Khan, accepted by Vice Mayor Kuo as the maker, and Councilmember Kim as the seconder, to:

Direct staff to enter into an agreement under the same parameters as the existing MOU with a one-year term beginning at the current expiration date in November, 2022, and expiring in November, 2023; and concurrently, enter into substantive discussions on what happens upon expiration of the one-year extension **as amended** to negotiate greater opportunities for community use of the facility during the one-year extension period.

ACTION: A friendly amendment was made by Councilmember Carroll, accepted by Vice Mayor Kuo as the maker, and Councilmember Kim as the seconder, and unanimously carried to:

- 1) Direct staff to enter into an agreement under the same parameters as the existing MOU with a one-year term beginning at the current expiration date in November, 2022, and expiring in November, 2023; and concurrently, enter into substantive discussions on what happens upon

expiration of the one-year extension as amended as follows:

- a) Negotiate greater opportunities for community use of the facility during the one-year term.
 - b) Remove the provision related to termination of the agreement without cause.
- 2) Direct staff to develop plans and a timeline to transition the Championship Soccer Stadium playing surface from grass to artificial turf, and return to the City Council with a report on the timeline and process to transition from natural grass to artificial turf no later than the last City Council meeting of 2022.

4.6 *CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY VICE MAYOR KUO TO DISCUSS THE UTILITY USERS TAX*

This item was agendaized at the request of Vice Mayor Kuo, who asked for City Council consideration of a one-time reimbursement of Utility Users Tax (UTT) funds to local taxpayers.

City Council discussion included: questioning the purpose of the tax on businesses; inquired about who the proposed reimbursement would apply to; questioned why such a large fund balance existed; inquired about whether cost recover for staff time to develop and administer the program had been factored in; questioned the total number of businesses in the City; inquired about whether a maximum reimbursement had been established; noted potential difficulties with administering a rebate program; provided a history of how and why the UUT was established; suggested a flat amount to all ratepayers; noted the need to have financial reserves; suggested other ways to utilize the excess fund balance; and suggested working with various ethnic chambers of commerce to disseminate program information in multiple languages.

ACTION: Moved by Vice Mayor Kuo, seconded by Councilmember Agran, and unanimously carried to:

Direct staff to explore and present options on the use of surplus dollars to fund a one-time reimbursement of approximately \$4.7 million of Utility Users Tax funds to local taxpayers.

ADJOURNMENT
