CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council and regular joint meeting with the City of Irvine as Successor Agency to the dissolved Irvine Redevelopment Agency was called to order at 4:09 p.m. on February 12, 2019 in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, One Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor/Chairman Wagner presiding.

Mayor Wagner noted that City Manager Russo was out of the office on business and would not be attending the City Council meeting.

Mayor Wagner convened the regular City Council meeting to Closed Session at 4:10 p.m.

RECONVENE TO THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Wagner reconvened the regular City Council meeting at 5:10 p.m. and announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Wagner led the Pledge of Allegiance.

INVOCATION

Senior Pastor Eric Geiger from Mariner's Church in Irvine provided the invocation.

1. PRESENTATIONS

1.1 Irvine Barclay Theatre

Mayor Wagner introduced the following individuals from the Irvine Barclay Theatre:

Mr. Rohl and Mr. Mandel provided a brief presentation related to the Irvine Barclay Theatre's mission and relationship with the City of Irvine, as well as information on event programming.

City Council discussion included: reiterating the City's long history with the Irvine Barclay Theatre (Theatre) and its contributions to the community; noted support for the sponsorship program; suggested that the Theatre be included on the useful life/maintenance matrix given that the Theatre is a City asset; and suggested replacement of the current lighting with light emitting diode (LED) lighting.

1.2 Southern California Gas Company — California's Balanced Energy Strategy

This item was agendaized at the request of Councilmember Fox, who introduced Lanae O'Sheilds, Public Affairs Manager with Southern California Gas Company, for a brief presentation on California's Balanced Energy Strategy.

1.3 Commend Sima Ranjbar, Senior Citizens Councilmember for Outstanding Community Service

Mayor Wagner introduced Sima Ranjbar, Senior Citizens Councilmember, and presented her with a commendation in recognition of her outstanding community service. Mayor Pro Tempore Shea also expressed her appreciation to Ms. Ranjbar as her appointee to the Senior Citizens Council, and wished her well in her upcoming retirement.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Assistant City Manager Marysheva introduced Mike Hamel, Chief of Police, who provided a brief report on the City's participation in the "Text 9-1-1" program; and Mark Steuer, Director of Public Works, who provided a brief update on the ruptured water main on Barranca between Harvard and Jamboree on February 7, 2019.

Mayor Wagner made the following announcements:

- Community members are invited to attend the Mayor's annual State of the City address on Tuesday, February 26 in the Council Chamber, where the Mayor will share accomplishments of the past year and plans for 2019. The event begins at 5 p.m. with a free, public reception in the Civic Center lobby, followed by the State of the City address at 6 p.m. No RSVP is needed. For information, visit cityofirvine.org.
- Registration is underway for the 2019 Irvine Junior Games, presented by the Irvine Children's Fund. Parents of Irvine Unified School District students in grades 4 through 8 are invited to register their child online at irvinejuniorgames.org. The deadline to register is February 22. This track-and field event is a key fundraising effort for the Irvine Children's Fund, which provides scholarships for before and after-school child care to low-income working families in the school district. The Irvine Junior games will take place on Sunday, May 5.

- Irvine has been ranked Number 1 in fiscal strength for the third consecutive year. The ranking of America's largest 75 cities calculated how a city would fare financially after all the bills are paid. Irvine was given a surplus score of \$4,400 per taxpayer, earning the distinction as the most fiscally healthy large city in the United States. - Community members are invited to share their thoughts and input on the City's two-year budget at an upcoming Community Budget Neighborhood meeting. 2.4 ACCEPTANCE OF COUNTY OF ORANGE OFFICE ON AGING GRANT INCREASE AND BUDGET ADJUSTMENT

ACTION:

- 1) Accepted additional County of Orange Office on Aging Title III grant funds in the amount of \$66,757 to fund the Elderly Nutrition Program, Nutrition Transportation, Case Management, and In-Home Services.

This item was removed for separate discussion at the request of Councilmember Kuo, who noted his opposition to the Kelvin Avenue Pedestrian Bridge project in his previous capacity as a Planning Commissioner.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shea expressed her overall support for pedestrian bridges in the Irvine Business Complex.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, to:

- 1) Approve the construction plans, specifications, and contract documents for the Kelvin Pedestrian Bridge over Barranca Channel, CIP 321201.

- 2) Approve the Engineer’s Estimate, Construction Contingency, and Project Funding Summary.
- 3) Authorize staff to solicit competitive bids and award the construction contract to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, which is in accordance with the City’s purchasing policies and procedures, within the approved project budget.

This item was removed for separate discussion at the request of Jane Olinger, Irvine resident, and Brigitte, community member, who spoke in opposition to the County of Orange’s planned development on land it owned adjacent to the Orange County Great Park.

Mayor Wagner noted that there were no immediate development plans for the property while the matter was in litigation.

4. PUBLIC HEARINGS

Patricia Song, Manager of Fiscal Services, presented the staff report.

Mayor Wagner opened the public hearing at 5:45 p.m. There were no requests to speak.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Fox, seconded by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, and unanimously carried to close the public hearing at 5:45 p.m.

There was no City Council discussion.

Prior to Mayor Wagner calling for a motion, City Clerk McLaughlin explained the procedural process for consideration of the recommended actions.

4.2 APPROVAL OF TAX-EXEMPT BOND ISSUANCE BY THE CALIFORNIA STATEWIDE COMMUNITIES DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY FOR FINANCING AN AFFORDABLE SENIOR HOUSING PROJECT FOR THE MAGNET SENIOR APARTMENTS

Patricia Song, Manager of Fiscal Services, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

Mayor Wagner opened the public hearing at 5:51 p.m. There were no requests to speak.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Khan, and unanimously carried to close the public hearing at 5:52 p.m.

City Council discussion included: clarifying the number of units designated for very low and moderate incomes; suggested a map be included in the future for reference with respect to the location of similar projects; and inquired about whether project information was hosted on the City's website and/or through the developer.

Pete Carmichael, Director of Community Development, provided an approximate location of the proposed project.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Khan, and unanimously carried to:

Patricia Song, Manager of Fiscal Services, presented the staff report.

Mayor Wagner opened the public hearing at 5:55 p.m. There were no requests to speak; however, Mayor Wagner noted that while a member of the community did not wish to speak, the individual expressed support for the project.

There was no City Council discussion.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Fox, seconded by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, and unanimously carried to:

Adopt RESOLUTION NO. 19-15 - A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVINE, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF THE CALIFORNIA MUNICIPAL FINANCE AUTHORITY MULTIFAMILY HOUSING REVENUE BONDS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$30,000,000 FOR THE PURPOSE OF FINANCING OR REFINANCING THE ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION, IMPROVEMENT AND EQUIPPING OF SALERNO APARTMENTS AND CERTAIN OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO

4.4 REVIEW OF ENFORCEMENT STRATEGY FOR BOARDING HOUSES, SHORT-TERM RENTALS AND CODE AMENDMENT TO CLARIFY THE DEFINITION OF BOARDING HOUSE

Mayor Wagner opened the public hearing at 5:57 p.m., noting that staff was requesting a continuance of the item to the March 12, 2019 meeting to allow additional time to analyze recommendations and impacts. There were no requests to speak.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kuo, seconded by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, and unanimously carried to:

Continue the public hearing to March 12, 2019.

5. COUNCIL BUSINESS

5.1 SENIOR SERVICES STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE FISCAL YEARS 2018-19 THROUGH 2022-23

Sheila Driscoll, Manager of Community Services, Sandra Salcedo, Community Services Superintendent, Carolyn Inmon, Chair, Senior Citizens Council, and Rachel Owenes, Member, Senior Citizens Council, presented the staff report.

Juneu Kim, Senior Citizens Councilmember, spoke in support.

City Council discussion included: expressing appreciation for sharing proposed ideas with the community, as well as the contributions made by the Senior Citizens Council.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kuo, seconded by Councilmember Khan, and unanimously carried to:

Adopt the Senior Services Strategic Plan Update Fiscal Years 2018-19 through 2022-23.

5.2 SCOPING SESSION FOR GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT IN WOODBRIDGE VILLAGE (PLANNING AREA 15)

Tim Gehrich, Deputy Director of Community Development, and Stacy Tran, Senior Planner, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

Ginger Shulman, LPA on behalf of the applicant, TGS, offered to answer questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning why the request was to rezone to office rather than multi-use; and suggested staff work with the applicant to address issues with mobility around the site, including visibility issues on Witherspoon as well as the intersection with East Yale Loop.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Fox, seconded by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, and unanimously carried to:

Receive staff report and provided input on subsequent analysis, and authorized staff to proceed with applications.

5.3 CONSIDER A REQUEST FROM COUNCILMEMBER FOX FOR FURTHER TRANSPARENCY BY NON-PROFIT ENTITIES THAT RECEIVE CITY FUNDING

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Fox, who suggested the application of the City of Irvine Sunshine Ordinance to non-profit entities that receive a minimum of \$500,000 per fiscal year of City funding in order to further promote the City's goal of enhancing transparency.

Marianna Marysheva, Assistant City Manager, presented the staff report and responded to questions; and noted the requirements that are currently in place to promote transparency.

Jeanne Baran, Irvine resident, spoke in support, and suggested that the Ordinance be applied to the Irvine Community Land Trust.

Robin Gurien, Irvine resident, submitted a request to speak but did not speak.

No action was taken.

5.4 CONSIDERATION OF COUNCILMEMBER KUO'S REQUEST TO SUPPORT THE REDUCING CRIME AND KEEPING CALIFORNIA SAFE ACT (INITIATIVE 17-0044)

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Kuo, who asked for City Council support of the Reducing Crime and Keeping California Safe Act (Initiative 17-0044), which would reestablish certain offenses as violent crimes, and would restore the DNA collection from those convicted of such crimes.

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident and on behalf of the League of Women Voters, did not provide a position, but rather, an analysis of the proposed initiative.

City Council discussion included: noting benefits and consequences, as well as potential impacts, with the proposed initiative; questioned whether the City has seen an increase in crimes after the passage of Proposition 47; discussed the issue of over-incarceration; noted that expert testimony was needed for further analysis; suggested that the City Council was not the proper forum for consideration of this initiative; reiterated the importance of being proactive with respect to preventing crime; and noted the City's participation in the Sex Trafficking Task Force and its priority to prevent such crimes.

Mike Hamel, Director of Public Safety/Chief of Police, noted that the City did see an increase in property crimes following the passage of Proposition 47.

Stephen Berger spoke in support of a veterans cemetery at the Amended and Restated Development Agreement (ARDA) site.

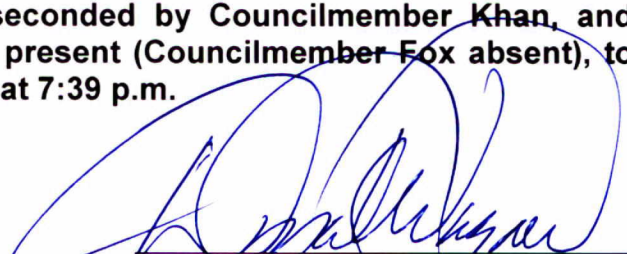
