CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council and regular joint meeting with the City of Irvine as Successor Agency to the dissolved Irvine Redevelopment Agency was called to order at 4:02 p.m. on July 9, 2024, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, 1 Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor/Chairwoman Khan presiding.

Following roll call, Councilmember/Boardmember Treseder noted that she would be participating virtually in the meeting due to a contagious illness. She also noted that she was required to disclose whether any individuals 18 years of age or older were present with her and her relationship to those individuals, as required by Assembly Bill 2449, and confirmed that no individuals 18 years of age or older were present with her during the meeting.

Mayor Khan recessed the City Council meeting to Closed Session at 4:07 p.m.

RECONVENE TO THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Khan reconvened the City Council meeting at 5:09 p.m. City Attorney Melching, on behalf of the City Council, announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

Councilmember Carroll led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Councilmember Carroll provided the invocation.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 Working Wardrobes

Bonni Pomush and Carlos Oregon, representing Working Wardrobes, provided a brief overview of the organization's mission, initiatives, and outreach and fundraising efforts.

City Council discussion included: expressing appreciation to the organization for its efforts to provide professional attire and other employment assistance; inquired about the organization's annual budget and source of donations; questioned the number of people served in a year; and inquired about the organization's website and donation methods.

By consensus, received and filed.

PUBLIC COMMENTS - CITY COUNCIL - NON-AGENDIZED ITEMS

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the lack of Americans with Disabilities Act standards for many Orange County Transportation Authority and Irvine CONNECT stops, and in support of the placement of sheltered benches at bus stops near senior and disabled housing facilities.

Alan Meyerson, Irvine resident, expressed concern about the confusion of an item related to the Climate Action and Adaptation Plan considered at the June 11, 2024, City Council meeting, and spoke in opposition to the work performed by a City Council candidate that has sued other cities for noncompliance with California Environmental Quality Act documents.

Mona spoke in opposition to the portrayal of a protest outside a synagogue in Los Angeles as antisemitic; in support of Working Wardrobes; and suggested careful consideration of where City funds are invested.

Janine Witter, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the location of an Irvine CONNECT shuttle stop at the intersection of Warner Avenue and West Yale Loop.

Molly Perry spoke in opposition to Irvine CONNECT shuttle stop locations in Woodbridge and the lack of outreach to those impacted by the stops.

Amal spoke in opposition to the portrayal of a protest outside a synagogue in Los Angeles, and noted a hate incident that she recently experienced.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to Israel's relationship with Azerbaijan, previous comments by Councilmember Treseder, the portrayal of a protest outside a synagogue in Los Angeles, and the characterization of Vice Mayor Agran as antisemitic.

Mayor Khan

- Mayor Khan will host Knitting for a Cause at Lakeview Senior Center on Tuesday, July 30, at 10 a.m., where attendees will knit chemo caps for residents undergoing treatment for cancer. Those interested are asked to sign up soon as space is limited. Those unable to attend can drop off knitted caps at Lakeview Senior Center on July 30. It is requested that participants use chemo yarn.
- Members of the public are asked to save the date and RSVP for the Youth and Senior All-Around Wellness Summit on August 18. Local experts will join Mayor Khan to offer presentations on health and local connectedness, and attendees of all ages will come together at the end for a fireside chat and Q&A on community issues and ideas. Additional details will follow from the Office of Mayor Khan.

- July is National Park and Recreation Month, and the City is celebrating with a collectible card challenge. Residents are invited to collect 17 unique cards representing the City's nationally ranked parks and facilities, along with a bonus card available to residents who ride Irvine CONNECT, the City's free shuttle. Collectors can gather at least eight cards to receive an exclusive pin. The collectible card challenge provides an opportunity for residents to explore some of the park and facility amenities throughout Irvine, and how these spaces offer opportunities to create and celebrate community. - While at the Great Park, visitors can grab a bite to eat and enjoy a refreshing beverage at the new eatery, The Layover, which is open weekends from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is located at the Terraced Lawn within the Great Park Sports Complex. The Layover offers additional food and beverage options for anyone attending events at Great Park Live, those attending sporting events, or visitors who are exploring the Great Park. A variety of mouthwatering menu items and beverages for all ages are available, including wine, beer, and an exclusive Great Park Live blonde lager, specially crafted by Brewery X. The venue also offers free games and inflatable slides for children.
- Free summer concerts will kick off at Mike Ward Community Park – Woodbridge with The Reflexx, which brings 80s hits, on Saturday, July 27. For an upcoming schedule and more information, visit cityofirvine.org/summer.
- The free Irvine CONNECT shuttle continues to provide convenient transportation for residents and visitors between the northern end of Irvine and Irvine Station with stops at parks, schools, hospitals, and shopping centers (including Irvine Spectrum). This summer, passengers can take Irvine CONNECT to the beach by riding to the stop at Alton Parkway and Laguna Canyon Road, and boarding the free Laguna Beach Summer Breeze trolley service, which picks up riders in the parking lot at 16355 Laguna Canyon Road. Irvine CONNECT is available from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. on weekdays and 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. on weekends, and shuttles arrive every 20 minutes. Riders can view the shuttle schedule and track the shuttles in real time using the Passio GO app or at irvineconnect.org.

Councilmember Kim

- As the City's representative on the Board of Directors of the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA), Councilmember Kim reported that OCFA responded to 1,672 service calls in June in Irvine. She also congratulated the 35 graduates of the OCFA's Training Academy 59, who will transition to active duty on June 28. On July 8, OCFA unveiled the newest addition to its fire fleet at John Wayne Airport, the Oshkosh Striker.
- As one of the City's representatives on the Board of Directors of the Orange County Power Authority (OCPA), Councilmember Kim reported that on July 1, OCPA launched the E-Bike Safety and Incentive Pilot Program, which aims to promote safe electric bicycle usage among customers 18 years of age and above. The program provides an opportunity to purchase e-bikes and helmets at a significantly lower cost through vouchers, \$600 for a standard level one and two e-bike, and \$1500 for income qualified customers, redeemable at two bike shops in Irvine. - Councilmember Kim noted a recent homicide that took place on July 8 at a for-profit sober living facility located less than 1,000 feet from a school. She also expressed her opposition to facilities that relocate individuals from other states in search of profit, and assume some of the limited housing supply, noting that other cities that have dealt with sober living home issues have established successful ordinances, and expressed her commitment to work with the Irvine Police Department to develop a plan to address the situation.

Vice Mayor Agran

- Vice Mayor Agran presented a Wall of Recognition Award to Mitsuye Yamada, a distinguished community member who recently turned 101 years old. Being of Japanese ancestry, her family was forcibly removed from their home and relocated to internment camps for the duration of World War II. Ms. Yamada was one of the first and most vocal of Asian-American women writers who spoke about the wartime incarceration of Japanese Americans, authoring Camp Notes and Other Poems and Desert Run: Poems and Stories. These works inform the reader about a distressing chapter in American history, while highlighting the lifelong need to be a human rights activist.

5.1 FIRST AMENDMENT TO CITY MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

Jeff Melching, City Attorney, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

Itzhak Fang spoke in opposition to the timing and scale of the proposed salary increase.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the proposed salary increase.

City Council discussion included: expressing appreciation to the City Manager for his creativity, leadership, and accomplishments.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Mayor Khan, and unanimously carried to:

Approve First Amendment to Amended and Restated Agreement For Employment of City Manager Between City of Irvine and Oliver C. Chi. **(Contract No. 11680A)**

5.2 EXCLUSIVE NEGOTIATING AGREEMENT WITH BROOKFIELD RESIDENTIAL FOR GATEWAY RESIDENTIAL VILLAGE

Pete Carmichael, Assistant City Manager, and Lauren Jung, Senior Management Analyst, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Oliver Chi, City Manager, and Jeff Melching, City Attorney, also responded to questions.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in support of additional research and discussion related to fire insurance availability trends and their impact on property values.

City Council discussion included: reiterating the need to maximize and extract monetary value; inquired about the number of single-family homes in the development; questioned the development's inclusion in the General Plan Update; inquired about measures to ensure owner occupation of the homes; questioned affordability within the proposed

development; and inquired about the City's response to insurance challenges and market fluctuations.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Treseder, seconded by Vice Mayor Agran, and unanimously carried to:

Approve an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement with Brookfield Residential for the Gateway Residential Village. **(Contract No. 11840)**

5.4 *CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER KIM TO DISCUSS MAINTAINING THE CITY'S EXISTING 25% GENERAL FUND RESERVE POLICY*

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Kim, who asked for City Council consideration to discuss maintaining the City's 25% General Fund reserve policy.

Dahle Bulosan, Director of Administrative Services, provided a brief overview of the General Fund Reserve Policy and funding levels, and responded to questions. Oliver Chi, City Manager, and Jeff Melching, City Attorney, also responded to questions.

Jay Bruce spoke in opposition to Councilmember Kim's submitted memorandum and questioned its timing.

The following individuals spoke in support of maintaining the City's 25% reserve fund policy:

Alan Meyerson, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to how Councilmember Kim's memorandum was written, and in support of using \$6 million in reserve funds to address human needs if such funds have been adjusted over time to account for the City's growth.

Mona spoke in opposition to how Councilmember Kim's memorandum was written and its use as a campaign tool.

David Chandler, Irvine resident, spoke in support of continued City investment in the pilot bus program for University High School students.

Rodin, Irvine resident, spoke in support of the City Council postponing action on how to spend \$6 million in reserve funds to the next meeting to increase transparency and public participation.

Itzhak Fang spoke in opposition to reducing reserve fund levels.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident and Community Services Commissioner, spoke in support of the motion to continue the item and refer the matter to the Finance Commission; and spoke in opposition to a proposed subcommittee.

Daniel K., Irvine resident, spoke in support of maintaining reserve fund levels at 25% and in opposition to a perceived violation of the Brown Act.

Robin Gurien, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the lack of transparency and in support of adoption of a reserve fund use policy.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to Councilmember Kim's use of the submitted memorandum as a campaign tool, and in support of tabling the item.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about the scope, process, and possible action as it related to the item; questioned the merits and appropriateness of reconsideration of reserve fund levels; inquired about the City's history of reserve funding percentages; suggested uses for a portion of reserve funds; inquired about the status of direction provided to staff at the June 25, 2024, City Council meeting; questioned whether the City's had a policy on reserve funds; requested an update on the University High School pilot bus program; inquired about the potential impacts of continuing the school busing program and adding a second bus on reserve funding levels, and questioned the potential use of other funding sources; and questioned communication with the Irvine Unified School District Board of Education regarding the proposed pilot bus program expansion.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, to:

Maintain the City's existing 25% General Fund reserve policy.

ACTION: A substitute motion was made by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Vice Mayor Agran, to:

Table this item and continue along the path of the motion approved at the City Council meeting of June 11, 2024, to:

- 1) Direct the City Manager to study the feasibility of drawing down reserve funds by approximately \$6 million.
- 2) Refer the question and advisability of drawing down reserve funds to the Finance Commission for review and return to the City Council for consideration of the Finance Commission's recommendation, and propose and discuss how to allocate those funds.

Following public comment and discussion, Councilmember Carroll withdrew the substitute motion.

ACTION: A substitute motion was made by Vice Mayor Agran to:

- 1) Direct the City Manager to engage on an accelerated basis in optimizing the Quail Hill school bus system, including drawing down its cost from reserve funds, as needed.
- 2) Direct staff to re-agendize further use of reserve funds for consideration at the September 10, 2024, City Council meeting.

Prior to seconding, Mayor Khan proposed an amendment to the substitute motion regarding funding for the Irvine Children's Fund.

ACTION: A substitute motion was made by Vice Mayor Agran, seconded by Mayor Khan, to:

- 1) Direct the City Manager to engage on an accelerated basis in optimizing the Quail Hill school bus system to University High School, including drawing down its cost from reserve funds, as needed.
- 2) Direct staff to re-agendize further use of reserve funds for consideration at the September 10, 2024, City Council meeting.
- 3) Allocate \$200,000 to the Irvine Children's Fund.

ACTION: A second substitute motion was made by Councilmember Treseder to:

Table the item in order to initiate discussions with the Irvine Unified School District (IUSD) Board of Education and Irvine Finance Commission regarding proposed uses for reserve funds.

The motion failed for lack of second.

ACTION: A second substitute motion was made by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, to:

- 1) Maintain the City's existing 25% General Fund reserve policy.
- 2) Return to IUSD to assess interest in City funding for a second bus from Quail Hill to University High School; if IUSD expresses interest, such funding shall be considered at a future City Council meeting.
- 3) Table the item and agendaize an item regarding funding and funding sources for the Irvine Children's Fund for discussion and consideration at the July 23, 2024, City Council meeting

- 3) Allocate \$200,000 to the Irvine Children's Fund.

This item was agendaized at the request of Councilmember Kim, who asked for City Council consideration to discuss the City's affordable housing strategy.

Oliver Chi, City Manager, provided a brief presentation on the City's affordable housing strategy and responded to questions. Jeff Melching, City Attorney, also responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning whether current efforts were being reviewed by the Health and Wellness program; inquired about the timeline to return for City Council discussion; requested clarification on the scope and potential actions related to increasing housing affordability; noted the housing component as part of the General Plan Update; and requested staff conduct further exploration of Senate Bill 649 and the embedding into the system of care.

By consensus, received and filed. No action was taken.
