CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council was called to order at 4:20 p.m. on February 9, 2021, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, One Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor Khan presiding.

Mayor Khan announced that the meeting was broadcast live on Cox Communications Local Access Channel 30 and AT&T U-Verse Channel 99, and livestreamed online at cityofirvine.org; and that in an effort to protect public health and prevent the spread of COVID-19, members of the public had the ability to provide live comments on agenda items using Zoom. She also noted that the e-comment feature had been extended for all agenda items, which allowed members of the public the ability to submit e-comments on all agenda items, which would be included as part of the official record and uploaded to the City's website. She also assured the community that the City of Irvine was adhering to the Governor's Executive Order in the Council Chamber and throughout City Hall by sanitizing surfaces and equipment, as well as wearing face masks.

Mayor Khan also announced that general public comments for the City Council on items not on the agenda would be considered at approximately 6:30 p.m.

Trevor Konte, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the All American Asphalt factory and asked the City Council to protect the residents impacted by adverse air quality.

Mayor Khan reconvened the City Council meeting at 5:34 p.m. City Attorney Melching, on behalf of the City Council, announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Mayor Kim led the Pledge of Allegiance.

INVOCATION

Reverend Ralph E. Williamson from Christ Our Redeemer AME Church provided the invocation.

Following the Invocation, Mayor Khan reordered the agenda to consider City Council Recognition Item No. 2.2 prior to Item No. 2.1.

2. CITY COUNCIL RECOGNITIONS

2.1 *Proclaim February 11, 2021, as "Irvine 2/11 Marine Battalion Day"*

This item was considered following City Council Recognition Item No. 2.2.

Mayor Khan presented a proclamation recognizing February 11, 2021, as "Irvine 2/11 Marine Battalion Day" in support of not only the 2/11 Marines, but all of the men and women in the military who have honorably served, and continue to serve, in the Armed Forces; and further acknowledged Irvine 2/11 Marine Adoption Committee members who have provided years of charitable support and services benefitting United States Marines and their families, and the continued partnership between the City and the 2/11 Marine Battalion since 2007.

Vice Mayor Kim also expressed her appreciation to the Second Battalion 11th Marine Regiment 1st Marine Division members who served in the Korean War, as well as the Korean-Demilitarized Zone from July 1953 to 1955.

2.2 *Proclaim February 2021 as "Black History Month"*

This item was considered prior to City Council Recognition Item No. 2.1.

Mayor Khan presented a proclamation in recognition of February 2021 as "Black History Month," which celebrates the rich contributions made by Black Americans to the social, cultural, and economic vibrancy of the United States and Irvine. Reverend Ralph E. Williamson from Christ Our Redeemer AME Church expressed his appreciation for the proclamation.

INTERIM CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

There was no report.

ANNOUNCEMENTS/COMMITTEE REPORTS/COUNCIL REPORTS

Councilmember Agran noted that he had received several calls from community members who had attempted to secure COVID-19 vaccination appointments, and that while the City had not been successful in securing the Orange County Great Park as a vaccination site, the Interim City Manager had confirmed that the City was fully prepared to make the Orange County Great Park available as a vaccination site within 48 hours if requested. He also noted that Mayor Khan had met with a local delegation from the State Assembly and State Senate regarding the progress of the Veterans' Cemetery.

In recognition of Black History Month and Irvine 2/11 Marine Battalion Day, Councilmember Kuo recognized Lieutenant Colonel Caleb Hyatt, previous Commanding Officer of the Irvine 2/11 Battalion, as he stood by Washington Headquarters Services Director, David Muir, on January 22, where he swore in Lloyd Austin III as the first African-American Secretary of Defense.

Mayor Khan made the following announcements:

- For the fourth straight year, the City of Irvine ranked No. 1 in fiscal strength across the country. The ranking of America's largest 75 cities calculated how a city would fare financially after all bills are paid. Irvine was given a surplus score of \$4,100 per tax-payer, earning the distinction as the most fiscally healthy large city in the United States. The "Financial State of the Cities" report was created by Truth in Accounting, a think tank that analyzes government financial reporting. The ranking confirms the City's commitment to ensuring resident tax dollars are being wisely managed. Maintaining a balanced budget, with the highest level of transparency, remained essential to the City Council. To learn more about the ranking, visit cityofirvine.org.
- The 2021 State of the City will take place on Tuesday, February 23, at 5 p.m. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the address will be delivered in a combination live and video format, and will not be open to the public. The State of the City Address will offer a look back on accomplishments from 2020 and will focus on highlights and initiatives for 2021, including the City's 50th anniversary. The State of the City Address will be available to watch on ICTV, Cox Communications Local Access Channel 30 and AT&T U-Verse Channel 99. It will also be live streamed online at cityofirvine.org/ictv and on YouTube at youtube.com/ictv30.
- The spring issue of *Inside Irvine* is being mailed to homes this week. The issue highlights the restoration of the Silverado Fire burn scar, features tips for living sustainable, provides COVID-19 updates, and more. The edition also included spring and summer camps, and classes for all interests and ages. All programs offered follow state and local guidelines to ensure the safety of participants and staff. - The COVID-19 and Business Reopening Task Forces continue to meet on a regular basis. The Business Reopening Task Force met last month, and the business community is partnering with the Irvine Cares initiative, which encourages everyone to take steps to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and advocates for safely reopening. Following approval of the Consent Calendar, Mayor Khan reordered the agenda to consider Council Business Item No. 5.4 prior to Public Hearing Item No. 4.1.

4. PUBLIC HEARINGS

4.1 **IRVINE BUSINESS COMPLEX TRAFFIC IMPROVEMENT FEE PROGRAM UPDATE AND PROJECT PRIORITIZATION**

This item was considered following Council Business Item No. 5.4.

Mayor Khan opened the public hearing at 8:32 p.m.

Lisa Thai, Supervising Transportation Analyst, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Jaimee Bourgeois, Deputy Director of Transportation, also responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about whether fees for the widening of Red Hill could be used elsewhere in the Irvine Business Complex (IBC) for other transportation projects; questioned whether other fees outside of the Red Hill widening project would fund all other projects in the IBC; inquired about whether other Capital Improvement Program projects within the IBC had deficiencies; questioned the City of Santa Ana's position on the project; inquired about the details of the cooperative agreement; questioned whether excess fees could be used to expand IBC transit; inquired about whether the City was obligated to lower the fees; suggested that the item be continued to a future meeting to allow staff additional time to conduct additional research on the proposed fees; inquired about which commissions reviewed the proposed item and the respective votes taken; questioned the methodology used in determining the cost/benefit analysis; inquired about why the number of lanes on Red Hill were being reduced from six lanes to four; and questioned why the proposed frequency of updates were decreased from every two years to three.

Jaimee Bourgeois, Deputy Director of Transportation, noted that there was not a demand to expand the *i*-Shuttle program at this time based on existing ridership numbers; and explained why the number of lanes were being reduced from six to four on Red Hill.

Jeff Melching, City Attorney, noted that the City was only allowed to charge fees for projects that were going to be built, and that if the Red Hill widening project was removed from the program, the City would be required to reduce the corresponding fees.

There were no public comments.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Agran to:

Continue the public hearing to the March 9, 2021, City Council meeting.

Motion failed due to lack of a second.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Councilmember Kuo, and unanimously carried to close the public hearing at 9:01 p.m.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kuo, seconded by Vice Mayor Kim, and unanimously carried to:

- 1) Approve the 2020 Irvine Business Complex Traffic Improvement Fee Program Update with exclusion of the Red Hill Avenue Widening project.
- 2) Direct staff to process an amendment to the County of Orange Master Plan of Arterial Highways to downgrade Red Hill Avenue between MacArthur Boulevard and Main Street from a six-lane major arterial highway to a four-lane primary arterial highway.
- 3) Approve the proposed prioritization of Irvine Business Complex transportation mitigation improvements.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kuo, seconded by Vice Mayor Kim, to:

5. COUNCIL BUSINESS

5.1 **COVID-19 SITUATIONAL UPDATE AND EXTENSION OF PCR TESTING AND LABORATORY SERVICES CONTRACTS**

Michelle Grettenberg, Assistant City Manager, and Charles Kovac, Housing Administrator, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning whether OC United Way could provide multiple language translations as part of the Emergency Rental Assistance Program (Program); inquired about whether any other non-profit organizations were contacted to help administer the Program; questioned whether City staff could assist the senior community with the Othena application and transportation to vaccination appointments; inquired about what measures were in place, if any, to ensure OC United Way and its subcontractors were serving the hardest to count, Latino, and Asian-Pacific Islander communities; inquired about administrative costs and whether an in-house team comprised of City staff was considered to administer the program; questioned whether the City or OC United Way would take the lead on communication efforts; inquired about how the Program would be branded; and expressed concern that rent increases were still occurring.

Marianna Marysheva, Interim City Manager, suggested that staff could return at the next City Council meeting with a detailed outreach plan developed in conjunction with OC United Way.

Melissa Haley, Deputy City Manager, noted that a kick-off meeting would be coordinated with OC United Way to establish a communication plan, with the City taking the lead on communication efforts.

City Attorney Melching noted that the resolution recommending all landlords and residents abide by the Governor's March 16, 2020 Executive Order N-28-20 continued to be extended with all other orders.

Gil Nelson, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to comments made by Mayor Khan related to vaccinating seniors by CVS; and inquired about why a vaccination site at the Orange County Great Park was rejected, what steps were being taken by the City Council to vaccinate Irvine Unified School District teachers, staff, and students to return to school, and which City staff members had been vaccinated.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in support of a vaccination site in Irvine.

Mayor Khan clarified that CVS was vaccinating seniors in the City at skilled nursing facilities and senior living facilities.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Mayor Khan, to:

- 1) Authorize the Interim City Manager to extend the contract for public and employee COVID-19 testing services with Curogram, Inc. through April 1, 2021 for an amount not-to-exceed \$52,000.
- 2) Authorize the Interim City Manager to enter into a funding agreement with United Way OC to administer and implement the \$17.7 million Emergency Rental Assistance Program, with administrative fees capped at 5%.

ACTION: A friendly amendment was made by Vice Mayor Kim, accepted by Councilmember Carroll as the maker of the motion and Mayor Khan as the seconder, and unanimously carried to:

- 1) Authorized the Interim City Manager to extend the contract for public and employee COVID-19 testing services with Curogram, Inc. through April 1, 2021 for an amount not-to-exceed \$52,000. **(Contract No. 11089I)**
- 2) Authorized the Interim City Manager to enter into a funding agreement with United Way OC to administer and implement the \$17.7 million Emergency Rental Assistance Program, with administrative fees capped at 5% **as amended** contingent upon staff returning at the next City Council meeting with a detailed outreach plan developed in conjunction with United Way OC. **(Contract No. 11260)**

5.2 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR KHAN AND COUNCILMEMBER KUO TO ADOPT AN URGENCY ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING LIMITATIONS ON THIRD-PARTY FOOD DELIVERY FEES

The item was agendized at the request of Mayor Khan and Councilmember Kuo, who requested City Council consideration to adopt of an urgency ordinance establishing limitations on third-party food delivery fees.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the proposed ordinance, noting a potential conflict-of-interest by Mayor Khan and Councilmember Kuo as owners of catering and restaurant businesses within the City, to which Mayor Khan clarified that her family's business was not operated within the City of Irvine, and Councilmember Kuo clarified that his family's business had been closed since 2007.

Hoiyin IP, Irvine resident, spoke in support of the proposed ordinance, and inquired about whether the ordinance could be extended beyond the COVID-19 pandemic for three to six months to provide restaurants additional opportunities to recover financially.

Luis Huang, Irvine resident, spoke in support of the proposed ordinance.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kuo, seconded by Vice Mayor Kim, and unanimously carried to:

Read by title only and adopt URGENCY ORDINANCE NO. 21-03 - AN URGENCY ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVINE, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING LIMITATIONS OF THIRD-PARTY FOOD DELIVERY FEES

5.3 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR KHAN, VICE MAYOR KIM, AND COUNCILMEMBERS AGRAN AND CARROLL TO DISCUSS THE RENAMING OF "SUICIDE HILL" IN TURTLE ROCK

The item was agendaized at the request of Mayor Khan, Vice Mayor Kim, and Councilmembers Agran and Carroll, who requested City Council consideration to rename "Suicide Hill" in Turtle Rock.

City Council discussion included: noting support by some to retain the name; suggested that any renaming be as inclusive as possible; questioned whether "Suicide Hill" was a formal or informal designation; inquired about whether any suicides had taken place at the location; questioned whether any signage existed with the reference of "Suicide Hill"; and inquired about the names of the two native tribes, suggesting the adoption of a new name be reflective of both tribes.

Melissa Haley, Deputy City Manager, noted that Community Services staff at the Portola Springs Community Center had sought guidance from Joyce Perry, who was in a leadership role with the local Indigenous community, and learned that the location was part of two native nations; and at Ms. Perry's suggestion, the renaming of the site should be easy to pronounce by the public and respectful to both nations.

Kevin Corrigan, Irvine high school student, spoke in support of renaming the location and offered a list of potential names developed by the Irvine youth population.

ACTION: Moved by Vice Mayor Kim, seconded by Councilmember Carroll, to:

Direct staff to continue with the formal renaming of "Suicide Hill" and return within sixty (60) days with recommendations.

The motion carried as follows:

5.4 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR KHAN TO ADOPT AN URGENCY ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING PREMIUM PAY FOR GROCERY WORKERS

This item was considered prior to Public Hearing Item No. 4.1, and was agendaized at the request of Mayor Khan, who requested City Council consideration to adopt an urgency ordinance establishing premium pay for grocery workers.

City Council discussion included: questioning which specific types of establishments would be impacted by the ordinance; discussed potential impacts to minority owned and ethnic serving markets; noted large profits by certain big box retailers that have not authorized premium pay for grocery workers; expressed concern about some larger establishments not following safety measures; requested clarification on the definition of “retail establishment;” questioned whether establishments that already provide premium pay, such as Trader Joe’s, would be subject to additional premium pay; inquired about the pending statuses of lawsuits filed by the California Grocers Association against other cities that have adopted similar ordinances; inquired about whether the City would become liable for any pay if the court struck down the legality of the ordinance or if any immunity would be granted to the City; clarified that most purchases at grocery stores were not subject to sales taxes; expressed concern that the proposed ordinance interfered with free market and did not address safety; expressed concern that businesses could potentially pass additional costs to consumers; and noted that profits by majority of these types of businesses are returned to its employees through retirement dividends.

Harvey Liss, Irvine resident, spoke in support of mandating N-95 masks for grocery workers.

At the request of Mayor Khan, City Attorney Melching clarified that an urgency ordinance would require a 4/5 vote of the City Council as required by the City Charter (Section 407) and Government Code Section 36937(b), and would be effective immediately if adopted; and that a regular ordinance would become effective 45 days from its first reading.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Khan, to:

Introduce for first reading and read by title only – ORDINANCE NO. 21-04 - AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVINE, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING PREMIUM PAY FOR GROCERY WORKERS as amended to reflect the following modifications:

- 1) Delete the word “urgency” from the title.
- 2) Amend Section 2(a)(6): “15 employees” to “20 employees”
- 3) Delete Section 5 (Urgency) in its entirety.

- 4) Add new Subsection 2 (a)(10)(d) as follows: *“Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, this Ordinance shall not apply to any store otherwise covered by Subsection (1), above, which is less than 15,000 square feet.”*
- 5) Delete Section 5 (Urgency) in its entirety.
- 6) Delete Section 7 (Effective Date) in its entirety.

Continuing City Council discussion included: suggesting that an exemption be written into the ordinance clarifying square footage; discussed the inclusion of a clause to exempt establishments that have already met or exceeded the requirements of the proposed ordinance; and suggested increasing the number of employees from 300 to 500.

Following discussion, Mayor Khan amended her motion.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Khan, seconded by Vice Mayor Kim, to:

Introduce for first reading and read by title only – ORDINANCE NO. 21-04 - AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVINE, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING PREMIUM PAY FOR GROCERY WORKERS **as amended to reflect the following modifications:**

- 1) Delete the word *“urgency”* from the title.
- 2) Amend Section 2(a)(6): *“15 employees”* was amended to *“20 employees;”* and *“300 employees”* was amended to *“500 employees.”*
- 3) Add new Subsection 2 (a)(10)(d) as follows: *“Notwithstanding anything in this section to the contrary, this Ordinance shall not apply to any store otherwise covered by Subsection (1), above, which is less than 15,000 square feet.”*
- 4) Delete Section 5 (Urgency) in its entirety.
- 5) Delete Section 7 (Effective Date) in its entirety.
