#### **CALL TO ORDER**

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council and regular joint meeting with the City of Irvine as Successor Agency to the dissolved Irvine Redevelopment Agency was called to order at 5:19 p.m. on April 11, 2023, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, 1 Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor/Chairwoman Khan presiding.

Mayor/Chairwoman Khan noted additional opportunities to participate in the meeting virtually; and encouraged those providing public comments to be civil, polite, and courteous when addressing one another, City staff, and members of the public.

In addition, Carl Petersen, City Clerk/Successor Agency Secretary, provided instructions on how to participate in the meeting; and noted that the e-comment feature had been extended, which allowed members of the public the ability to submit e-comments on all agenda items, which would be included as part of the official record and uploaded to the City's website.

Mayor Khan asked for a moment of silence in memory of Allyson Dierdorff, Civilian Traffic Investigator, who passed away on March 24 following a recently diagnosed medical condition.

## **5. PUBLIC HEARINGS**

### **5.1 PUBLIC HEARING REQUESTING INPUT REGARDING THE COMPOSITION OF POTENTIAL COUNCIL ELECTION DISTRICTS (6 P.M.)**

Mayor Khan opened the public hearing at 6:11 p.m.

Brian King, Assistant City Manager; Justin Levitt, Vice President, National Demographics Corporation; and Kylie Sun, Tripepi Smith; presented the staff report and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning how maps would be identified for City Council consideration; inquired about whether someone could annotate and present comments with their map submission; questioned the maximum allowable deviation between districts; inquired about who would vote on the final map that would be submitted to the voters; questioned the potential outcome if the City Council did not agree on any of the submitted maps; inquired about who would be eligible to submit maps, including Councilmembers, residents, and anonymous submissions; discussed whether elected officials should have the ability to select their voters via districts; reiterated that the districting process should be fair and compliant with the California Voter Rights Act (CVRA); inquired about how to identify and use information related to certain cultures and ethnicities, and how this information is used to create communities of interest; questioned how a racial polarization analysis would be conducted, and how ecological and racial fallacies would be prevented; inquired about whether the second public hearing could occur following all community workshops; and noted difficulties to access the drawirvine.com website while on City servers.

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident, spoke in support of keeping planning areas and unique villages together; noted that the drawirvine.com website was confusing; and suggested that Concordia University and University of California, Irvine (UCI) not be placed within the same district.

Scott Perkey, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to City Council expansion and in support of four districts.

Zachary Griggy, Irvine resident, spoke in support of keeping UCI and nearby student housing within the same district; and asked that UCI not be placed in non-compatible economic districts.

Nini Wu, Irvine resident, suggested that UCI be kept together within the same district.

Tom Chomyn and Doug Elliott, Irvine residents, spoke in support of district elections and City Council expansion.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident, spoke in support of district elections and robust outreach, including social media.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in support of robust outreach and inclusion of all demographics.

**ACTION: Moved by Vice Mayor Kim, seconded by Councilmember Carroll, and unanimously carried to close the public hearing at 7:34 p.m.**

**2.2 Proclaim April 2023, as “Community College Awareness Month”**

Mayor Khan introduced Letitia Clark, Chief Communications Officer, South Orange County Community College District, and presented a proclamation recognizing April 2023, as “Community College Awareness Month.” Trustee Carolyn Inmon, Trustee Ryan Dack, Chancellor Julianna Barnes, and Irvine Valley College President John Hernandez were also in attendance.

### **2.3 Orange County Power Authority Audit**

Oliver Chi, City Manager, introduced Gary Saleba and Howard Choy from EES Consulting (EES), who presented a brief operational review of the Orange County Power Authority (OCPA).

City Council discussion included: questioning whether EES received all information requested from OCPA; inquired about whether EES received an explanation of high start-up costs and whether OCPA has been purchasing renewable energy; questioned the potential reasons for negative press; noted the need to reduce opt-out rates; reiterated the desire to reform OCPA; expressed concern that the inability for choice would ensue if OCPA were to fail; noted active steps currently undertaken to address shortcomings identified by the Orange County Grand Jury and State audit; questioned whether OCPA rates were competitive with similar entities; inquired about whether OCPA was on track operationally; questioned whether EES had been paid by OCPA and whether such information was disclosed in its report; inquired about whether OCPA paid fines for resource inadequacy; and questioned whether a Power Resources Director had been hired by OCPA.

Michelle Johnson, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the audit as presented by EEC, noting the lack of information contained in the audit report.

The project will be funded from a combination of higher education student housing grant program funds and external financing.

#### Councilmember Treseder

- Councilmember Treseder announced that the next Orange County Power Authority (OCPA) meeting would be held on April 19 at 10 a.m. Interested individuals can participate in person or via Zoom. Two items of concern have been agendaized, including the dismissal of OCPA personnel, and another to appoint an interim chief executive officer. OCPA also provided Councilmember Treseder with access to the purchase power agreements that are up to date, which will be further analyzed.

#### Vice Mayor Kim

- Last week, Vice Mayor Kim had the opportunity to host an international delegation from Kukkiwon Grand Master Lee Dong Sup, which is the world Taekwondo Headquarters. She had the chance to host the international delegation and presented them with a proclamation proclaiming September 9 as Taekwondo Day in the City of Irvine, which was recently approved by the City Council.
- Vice Mayor Kim, along with the Orange County Fire Authority, will host a family-friendly event to learn about fire safety from firefighters on Saturday, April 29 from 9:30 – 11 a.m. at Fire Station 6 near City Hall.

Councilmember Carroll

- Councilmember Carroll held an Indian Spring Festival this past Saturday at Mike Ward Community Park. The Indian Holi celebration was combined with the traditional spring celebrations that happen across the Indian community. Several Indian Spring Festivals were combined into one event. The community came out to celebrate Holi, Vaisakhi, Bihu, Vishu, Poila Bishak Ugadi, and Puthandu. Traditional dancers, music, Indian food, and the throwing of colors were available, with almost 200 people attending the event. Councilmember Carroll expressed his appreciation to all community members in attendance, as well as Anil Kumar and Gaurav Bhargava with the United Indian American Association.

Branda Lin, Irvine resident, expressed her appreciation to all who attend City Council meetings; and in support of eliminating the 90-second rule for public comments.

Raj Bhatia, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to bass and other sound issues related to the proposed larger amphitheater.
