CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council was called to order at 4:07 p.m. on January 9, 2024, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, 1 Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor Khan presiding.

Following roll call, Councilmember Carroll announced that he would be participating virtually in the meeting due to a contagious illness. He also noted that he was required to disclose whether any individuals 18 years of age or older were present with him in the room and his relationship to those individuals as required by Assembly Bill 2449, and confirmed that no individuals 18 years of age or older were present with him in the room during the meeting.

RECONVENE TO THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Khan reconvened the City Council meeting at 5:10 p.m. City Attorney Melching, on behalf of the City Council, announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Councilmember Treseder led the Pledge of Allegiance.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 *Proclaim January 13, 2024, as "Korean American Day"*

Mayor Khan introduced Charles Kim, District Representative on behalf of California State Senator Dave Min, and representatives from several Korean American organizations, and presented a proclamation recognizing January 13, 2024, as "Korean American Day."

2.2 *Proclaim January 15, 2024, as "Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day"*

Mayor Khan introduced Amil Aaron, Chair of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, and representatives from other organizations, and presented a proclamation recognizing January 15, 2024, as "Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day."

Following presentations, Mayor Khan reordered the agenda to consider the City Manager's Report, Announcements/Committee Reports/Council Reports, and Additions and Deletions prior to public comments on non-agendized items. She also announced that only thirty minutes of public comments on non-agendized items would be taken initially, and that all other public comments for non-agendized items would be taken following consideration of all agendized items.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

City Manager Chi provided a brief overview related to an ethics complaint received on December 22, 2023 related to statements made by Mayor Khan and Vice Mayor Agran regarding the situation in the Middle East, use of City resources specific to the deployment of members of the Irvine Police Department at the December 12 meeting, and consideration of nonmunicipal matters. City Attorney Melching also provided a brief overview of the investigative process and noting findings of no wrongdoing and the basis for that finding.

ANNOUNCEMENTS/COMMITTEE REPORTS/COUNCIL REPORTS

Mayor Khan

- Mayor Khan expressed appreciation to Joy Sun, Irvine resident and high school student, for her founding of the Change into Change Foundation, a certified Irvine Green Business, which offers a t-shirt with interchangeable designs and allows individuals to be environmentally sustainable with their clothes while highlighting the designs. Ms. Sun is one of a few high school students in Irvine to achieve that certification. To learn more, visit ChangeintoChange.com.
- Last month, Mayor Khan hosted a Small Business Town Hall with Small Business Administration (SBA) Deputy Administrator Dilawar Syed that included over 100 attendees who learned about SBA's resources and grant opportunities. SBA lent \$1.2 billion in Orange County with additional funding anticipated sometime this year. The City will host additional follow up events to ensure that its businesses connect with needed resources and support.
- The City is partnering with Switch is On and Southern California Edison to provide a free Electrification 101 Workshop from 6 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, January 17, at City Hall. Attendees will hear testimonials from residents and learn: 1) what it means to transition from gas to electric-powered appliances; 2) how to make energy-efficient upgrades that save both energy and money; and 3) what federal, state, and local rebates are available. The event includes an expo from 7 to 8 p.m. that allows members of the public to connect with local organizations, contractors to learn more about joining the City's path to achieving its climate goals, and customers to learn how to save money and energy by electrifying. - The Irvine Animal Care Center (IACC) will conclude its Holiday Donation Drive on Monday, January 15, which allows IACC to continue its lifesaving work through the Enhanced Care, Third Chance for Pets, and Foster Care programs. Thanks to community support, IACC has found homes for more than 13,750 animals through the Third Chance for Pets program since it began in 1999. Community support also enabled IACC to provide enhanced care treatment as well as quality care recovery for hundreds of underage, ill, or recuperating animals in the Foster Care program last year. Councilmember Kim

- The Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA) is equipped to tackle the most challenging fires and protect our open space. The OCFA's Quick Reaction Force has three of the world's largest firefighting helicopters capable of dropping 3,000 gallons of water. In addition, OCFA is upgrading its firefighting infrastructure with the introduction of the HeloPod near Ortega Highway, which will significantly improve the helicopters' access to water during wildfires in and around Orange County, including Irvine. Councilmember Kim expressed appreciation to the men and women of OCPA for their readiness to protect the community.
- During the winter, the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District received an increased number of complaints related to rat infestation in residential areas due to rodents seeking shelter in warmer environments. However, several effective methods for residents are available to protect homes from infestation. For more information, visit OCVector.org/rats.
- Orange County Public Libraries is holding a library card design competition with the theme "Blast from the Past" that combines retro 1980s and 1990s elements. Members of the public can submit their artwork by January 31 for a chance to have it featured on a special edition library card for Comic Orange 2024. Councilmember Treseder

- Councilmember Treseder expressed her appreciation to those in attendance, and suggested decorum and politeness be respected in order to hear all speakers.
- Councilmember Treseder provided the following updates related to the Orange County Power Authority (OCPA):
 - At its meeting of December 2023, the OCPA Board of Directors adopted its 2024 meeting schedule. Beginning in February 2024, OCPA Board meetings will be held the third Tuesday of each month at 10 a.m.
 - The Board unanimously adopted the independent financial audit for OCPA's most recent fiscal year completed by P&B, a firm specializing in Community Choice Aggregation Audits, which affirmed the accuracy of OCPA's financial statements and the absence of material weaknesses in internal controls.

- OCPA is continuing to recruit a Chief Executive Officer (CEO) with the goal to have one in place by the end of the month; and the Board will interview a small number of finalists during its next meeting on January 24.
- OCPA has received Southern California Edison's (SCE) rate related data for 2024, which are projections for SCE's anticipated rates that are needed to determine OCPA rates. This information will be considered at the January 24 OCPA Board meeting.

Mayor Khan noted that the proposed appointments were based on her recommendations following discussions with her City Council colleagues.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident, in support of Councilmember Kim's efforts pertaining to affordable housing, and suggested that she, along with Vice Mayor Agran, continue serving on the Irvine Community Land Trust Board.

J spoke in support of Councilmember Carroll replacing Councilmember Kim on the Irvine Community Land Trust Board.

City Council discussion included: discussing the methodology related to the proposed appointments; suggested opportunities to balance outside appointments amongst members of the City Council; and noted prior efforts and accomplishments by Councilmembers who served on outside agency boards.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Kim, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, to:

- 1) Appoint City Council delegates and alternates to outside governmental agencies on which the City has representation for the 2024 calendar year, **as amended** to remove the appointment to the Irvine Community Land Trust for separate consideration.
- 2) Appoint City Council representatives and approve staff appointments to various City of Irvine advisory Commissions, Committees and Task Forces for the 2024 calendar year.

4.2 ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING CHANGES AND ADDITIONS TO POSTED SPEED LIMITS

Angelina Banda, Associate Engineer, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Kerwin Lau, Deputy Director of Transportation, was also available for questions.

EJ spoke in support of the proposed amendments to speed limits; suggested speed limits for electric bicycles; suggested that signal timing be evaluated, particularly at the corner of Moffett and Harvard; and noted inconsistent speed limits on Moffett approaching the Costa Mesa (55) Freeway.

City Council discussion included: requesting additional information related to the process of increasing and decreasing speed limits; suggested the implementation of protected bicycle lanes and traffic calming as additional measures; and inquired about traffic signal timing at Harvard and Moffett and speed limits on Moffett.

ACTION: Moved by Vice Mayor Agran, seconded by Councilmember Kim, and unanimously carried to:

Introduce for first reading and read by title only ORDINANCE NO. 24-01 – AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVINE, CALIFORNIA, DIRECTING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CITY OF IRVINE ENGINEERING AND TRAFFIC SURVEYS FOR SPEED LIMITS, AS MAINTAINED BY THE PUBLIC WORKS & TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT AS THE OFFICIAL DOCUMENTATION OF DECLARED PRIMA FACIE SPEED LIMITS

4.3 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER TRESEDER TO UPDATE POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR CITY COUNCIL AGENDAS AND MEETINGS

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Treseder, who asked for City Council consideration to update policies and procedures for City Council agendas and meetings, which included amended language related to electronic voting and displaying the dais during virtual public comment, except when multimedia files are presented.

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident, spoke in support of considering public comments on non-agendized matters following the completion of the agenda; in support of limiting comments on non-agendized items to matters within the City’s jurisdiction; and in support of keeping the camera on the dais during public comments.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident, spoke in support of Councilmember Treseder’s proposed changes related to keeping the cameras on the dais during public comments and the voting policy.

EJ and Jeremy Ficarola, Irvine resident, spoke in support of electronic voting.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in support of implementing similar changes at Orange County Power Authority meetings.

City Council discussion included: discussing the merits of voting electronically versus roll call voting; requested additional information on how votes are conducted by City Commissions; and noted the importance of accountability and understanding.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Treseder, seconded by Councilmember Kim, and unanimously carried to:

- 1) Amend the Remote Participation Policy to read, in part: "Members of the public shall be permitted to view public meetings and provide public comments for agendized items and non-agendized items via Zoom or other City-approved virtual platforms. During public comments provided via Zoom or other City-approved virtual platforms, the exclusive focus of the visual display to remote attendees shall be the City Council dais, except where multimedia materials have been provided for display.
- 2) Continue approval of proposed amendments to the Voting Policy pending further study by staff of voting practices by City Commissions and elsewhere.

4.4 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR KHAN TO UTILIZE INTERNATIONAL ALLIANCE OF THEATRICAL STAGE EMPLOYEES (IATSE) LOCAL 504 FOR STAGEHAND STAFFING AT THE TEMPORARY AND PERMANENT AMPHITHEATERS AT GREAT PARK

This item was agendized at the request of Mayor Khan, who asked for City Council consideration to utilize IATSE Local 504 for stagehand staffing at the temporary and permanent amphitheatres at Great Park.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident, spoke in support.

City Council discussion included: questioning whether stagehand staffing provisions were already included in the request for proposals; questioned whether events such as Irvine Nights and Global Village would also be included, and whether labor IATSE Local 504 would replace City staff; and inquired about size and scope mandates.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Khan, seconded by Councilmember Kim, and unanimously carried to:

Direct the City Manager to utilize International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE) Local 504 for stagehand staffing at the temporary and permanent amphitheatres at Great Park.

4.5 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER TRESEDER TO DISCUSS A MOCK VILLAGE PROPOSAL IN PARTNERSHIP WITH PAYÓMKAWICHUM KAÁMALAM

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Treseder, who asked for City Council consideration to discuss a mock village proposal in partnership with Payómkawichum Kaámalam.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the proposal, and questioned why this particular group was chosen over others.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about programming, staffing, and operational expenses; and inquired about the scope of the proposal.

- 1) Engage Payómkawichum Kaámalam and the Acjachemen Nation on development of a mock village in Irvine, to include, but not be limited to, identifying a location for the village, creating preliminary designs for the village, and gathering other pertinent details related to building the village.
- 2) Present this information to the City Council for its review and consideration within 90 days.
- 3) If the City Council approves the project to move ahead at that time, direct that staff identify funding and seek all of the necessary approvals related to building the mock village at that time.
- 4) Direct staff to reach out to other indigenous nations, including the Kizh also known as Tongva.
