### **CALL TO ORDER**

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council and regular joint meeting with the City of Irvine as Successor Agency to the dissolved Irvine Redevelopment Agency was called to order at 4:07 p.m. on April 24, 2018 in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, One Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor/Chairman Wagner presiding.

Mayor Wagner convened the City Council meeting to Closed Session at 4:08 p.m.

## RECONVENE TO THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Wagner reconvened the City Council meeting at 5:12 p.m. City Attorney Melching, on behalf of the City Council, announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

Mayor Wagner introduced Boy Scout Troop 602, who led the Pledge of Allegiance; and Police Chief Hamel introduced the Irvine Police Color Guard, who presented the colors in recognition of National Police Week.

Pastor Ben Prescott from Free Chapel OC of Irvine provided the invocation.

## MOMENT OF SILENCE

Mayor Wagner requested a moment of silence in memory of former First Lady, Barbara Bush.

## 2. PRESENTATIONS

- 2.1 **Proclaim May 13-19, 2018 as “National Police Week”**

Mayor Wagner introduced Mike Hamel, Director of Public Safety/Chief of Police; Mike Hallinan, Police Commander; and members of the Irvine Police Color Guard, and presented a proclamation recognizing May 13-19, 2018 as “National Police Week.”

**2.2 Young Master's Art Show 2018 Cover Artist**

Mayor Wagner introduced Jill Houskey and Mary Ann Breckenridge from Assistance League of Irvine; and recognized Audrey Park, fourth grade student from Portola Springs Elementary, as the "2018 Cover Artist" for her winning entry in the Young Masters Art Show.

**2.3 Commend Katherine McPhie, University High School Student**

Mayor Wagner introduced Katherine McPhie, University High School sophomore, and presented a commendation recognizing her for her philanthropic efforts; and congratulated her on being recognized by the Disneyland Resort's "Dreamers and Doers" program as one of top five "Luminaries."

Mikey Trujillo, Disney Ambassador, provided information on the "Dreamers and Doers" program and how Ms. McPhie was selected as a Luminary; and Ms. McPhie provided a donation check in the amount of \$3,000 to representatives from the Orange County Rescue Mission.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shea made the following announcements:

- The annual City of Irvine Senior Services volunteer recognition luncheon was held on Friday, April 20 at the Lakeview Senior Center, where volunteers who donated more than 500 hours of their time in 2017 were recognized.
- Irvine was the host City for the 36<sup>th</sup> Annual National Pesticide Forum on April 13 and 14 at the Beckman Center of the National Academy of Science and Engineering, paneled by Beyond Pesticides, the U.C. Center for Occupational Environmental Health, and Non-Toxic Irvine with 250 people attending from all over the country.

Councilmember Schott noted that last week was California Mosquito Awareness Week to raise awareness and educate residents about the threat mosquitos can pose. She also provided ways to reduce the risk of mosquito bites and encouraged members of the community to visit [ocvector.org](http://ocvector.org) for more information; and provided a short video presentation by the Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District on the potential impacts of West Nile Virus.

Mayor Wagner made the following announcements:

- The community is invited to provide input on the renovation of Bommer Canyon Cattle Camp at a workshop on April 25, 2018 from 6 to 7:30 p.m. at Las Lomas Community Center, which will focus on refurbishing the former Cattle Camp originally built in 1967. - The City of Irvine will participate in the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's "National Prescription Drug Take Back Day" on Saturday, April 28, which provides a safe, secure way of disposing prescription medication. Residents are encouraged to bring expired and unwanted medication to one of four locations between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., which include the Irvine Police Department, Kaiser Permanente Irvine Medical Center, Hoag Health Center on Sand Canyon, and Irvine Valley College (Parking Lot 5). Mayor Wagner also noted that he met with South Orange County Mayors to discuss a collective response to the countywide homeless crisis, and sent a letter to the Orange County Board of Supervisors (Board) proposing the former campus at Silverado Elementary School located off Santiago Canyon Road in unincorporated Orange County. A video outlining the results of that meeting and the proposal is available on the City's website. Staff confirmed that the Board met earlier in the day and voted not to pursue a potential South County emergency shelter suggested at that site. A letter, which will be made available to the public, will be sent to the Board inquiring about its rejection and urging it to reconsider the proposed site.

- 2) Authorized the Mayor to execute a new Professional Services Agreement with Proactive Engineering Consultants increasing the design services fee for the Orange County Great Park Western Sector Roadways Capital Improvement Project by \$175,000 for the Bosque Avenue Extension for a new total not-to-exceed design service fee amount of \$1,161,416. **(Contract No. 10154)**
- 3) Authorized the Manager of Engineering to negotiate and execute a construction contract change order for the Orange County Great Park Western Sector Roadways Capital Improvement Project, in the amount not-to-exceed \$475,000, with Sukut Construction, LLC, to construct the extension of Bosque Avenue.

**5. PUBLIC HEARINGS**

**5.1 APPROVAL OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT AND HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS 2018-2019 ACTION PLAN FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS**

Steve Holtz, Manager of Neighborhood Services, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Charles Kovak, Housing Administrator, was also available for questions.

Mayor Wagner opened the public hearing at 5:56 p.m.

Madeline Hurneise, representing Families Forward, expressed her appreciation to the City Council for its continued support over the years; and invited the City Council to its upcoming Community Resource Fair on Saturday, April 28 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Kevin Trussell, Community Services Commissioner, provided a brief summary of the recommendations made by the Community Services Commission.

**ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to close the public hearing at 6:02 p.m.**

City Council discussion included: suggesting that future funding be disseminated to nonprofit groups rather than City capital projects; inquired about funds for improvements to community parks; and questioned the specific Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) improvements proposed at various City sites and reiterated that the proposed ADA improvements exceeded State standards.

**ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to:**

**5.2 ZONE CHANGE TO AMEND CHAPTER 9-6 OF THE IRVINE ZONING ORDINANCE RELATED TO THE DISTRIBUTION OF DWELLING UNITS WITHIN PLANNING AREA 6 (PORTOLA SPRINGS)**

Mayor Wagner reopened the public hearing at 6:10 p.m. and noted that a request was made by the applicant to continue the public hearing to a date uncertain. There were no requests to speak.

**ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to:**

Continue the public hearing to a date uncertain.

**6. COUNCIL BUSINESS**

**6.1 CONSIDER IRVINE BARCLAY THEATRE REQUESTS FOR (1) HEATING, VENTILATION, AND AIR CONDITIONING IMPROVEMENTS FUNDING; AND, (2) COMMITMENT REGARDING ANNUAL CITY CONTRIBUTION LEVELS THROUGH 2026**

Michelle Grettenberg, Deputy City Manager, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

Jerry Mandel, representing the Irvine Barclay Theatre, spoke in support; and provided reassurance to the City Council that additional fundraising efforts would be made to cover other operational and maintenance projects.

City Council discussion included: reiterating the City's responsibilities with respect to the Irvine Barclay Theatre (Theatre); noted that a Capital Improvement Project (CIP) budget was never created when the original agreement was executed; reiterated the potential impacts if the heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system became inoperable; inquired about the financial impact of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) escalator and questioned the miscalculation of the estimated annual contribution noted in the staff report; suggested partial approval of the \$1.207 million requested for replacement of two air-chillers (year one request), with the remaining amount to be considered for approval over the next two fiscal years; inquired about University of California, Irvine's (UCI) offer to connect the Theatre to its power grid and whether its offer was contingent on the City's full financial contribution for HVAC replacement; suggested that the agreement be reviewed and modified by the City Attorney in collaboration with City and Theatre staff; and questioned ramifications, if any, that may ensue by bifurcating the Theatre's request for HVAC replacement funding.

Grace Leung, Acting City Manager, noted that the actual amount of each annual contribution would be based on the CPI in effect at that time.

**ACTION:** Moved by Councilmember Schott to:

Approve Irvine Barclay Theatre's request for 1) \$1,207,000 funding (spread over three years) to repair the Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning system; and 2) a commitment from the City to continue funding Irvine Barclay Theatre's operational costs at \$925,000 per year (including the amended estimated annual contribution based on the Consumer Price Index adjustment) through 2026.

Motion failed for lack of second.

**ACTION:** Moved by Councilmember Schott to:

- 1) Approve Irvine Barclay Theatre’s request for 1) \$1,207,000 funding (spread over three years) to repair the Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning system; and 2) a commitment from the City to continue funding Irvine Barclay Theatre’s operational costs at \$925,000 per year (including the amended estimated annual contribution based on the Consumer Price Index adjustment) through 2026.
- 2) Require Irvine Barclay Theatre staff to meet and confer with City budget staff each budget cycle to provide an update on Irvine Barclay Theatre finances and confirm the dollar amounts allocated by the City Council.
- 3) Direct the City Attorney to work with Irvine Barclay Theatre and City staff to review the existing maintenance and operation agreement, and make adjustments to the contract provisions as needed.

Motion failed for lack of second.

**ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to:**

- 1) Approve Irvine Barclay’s request for 1) \$412,000 funding to replace two air-chillers with higher efficiency chillers as part of its Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning system; and 2) a commitment from the City to continue funding Irvine Barclay Theatre’s operational costs at \$925,000 per year (including the amended estimated annual contribution based on the Consumer Price Index adjustment) through 2026. **(Contract No. 10159)**
- 2) Direct the City Attorney to work with Irvine Barclay Theatre and City staff to review the existing maintenance and operation agreement, and make adjustments to the contract provisions as needed.

## **6.2 CITY OF IRVINE TOWING SERVICES AGREEMENT**

Mike Hamel, Director of Public Safety/Chief of Police, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Matt August, Police Sergeant, and Portia Mina, Purchasing Agent, were also available for questions.

Tyler Miller, representing G&W Towing, spoke in support of the proposed agreement.

The following individuals spoke in opposition to the proposed agreement:

City Council discussion included: questioning an incident related to a stolen vehicle with one of the proposed vendors; reiterated that the request for proposals (RFP) process was unbiased and transparent, with clear benchmarks based on the City's needs; and requested clarification on the contract approval process.

Director of Public Safety Hamel summarized the issues and concerns raised with the prior RFP process.

City Attorney Melching clarified that while prospective vendors were asked to sign proposed contracts ahead of time, all were made aware that contracts were contingent upon City Council approval.

**ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Fox, seconded by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to:**

Authorize City staff to award and enter into contracts for towing services with MetroPro Road Services, Inc. **(Contract No. 10156)** and G&W Towing, Inc. **(Contract No. 10157)**. The proposed contract period will be from June 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019, and the City reserves the right to extend each contract for up to four additional one-year periods.

**6.3 CONSIDERATION OF MAYOR WAGNER'S REQUEST RELATED TO ASSEMBLY BILL 2003 (DALY), BIDDING NOTICES FOR SANITATION DISTRICTS PUBLIC CONTRACTING**

This item was agendized at the request of Mayor Wagner, who provided a summary of Assembly Bill 2003 with respect to bidding notices for sanitation districts public contracting, and asked that the City Council take a support position on the proposed bill.

There was no City Council discussion.

**ACTION: Moved by Mayor Pro Tempore Shea, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and unanimously carried by those members present (Councilmember Lalloway absent), to:**

Authorize the Mayor to send a letter of support on behalf of the City, and authorize staff and the Mayor to take other appropriate steps in support of Assembly Bill 2003, as needed.

**PUBLIC COMMENT-CITY COUNCIL**

Lenore Albert Sheridan announced her candidacy for Orange County District Attorney.

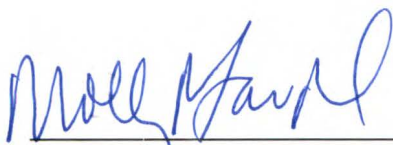

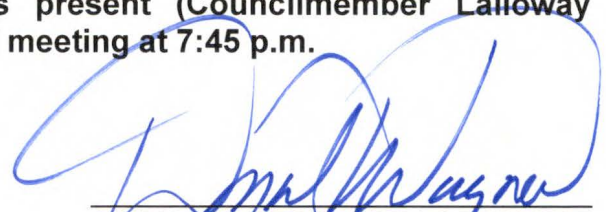
