RECONVENE TO THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Mayor Agran reconvened the City Council meeting at 5:02 p.m. City Attorney Melching, on behalf of the City Council, announced that no reportable action was taken in Closed Session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Councilmember Go led the Pledge of Allegiance.

INVOCATION

Jay White, Irvine resident, performed “What a Wonderful World” and “The Christmas Song/Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire.” Beth Krom, former Mayor and City Councilmember, expressed appreciation to the City Council for providing the opportunity for the performance.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 *One Irvine Workforce Apprenticeship Program*

Jennifer Hale, Senior Management Analyst, and Jennifer Warren, Program Specialist, provided a brief update on the One Irvine Workforce Apprenticeship Program and recognized graduates from the program’s first cohort.

2.2 *UCI Health Irvine Update*

Nate Shinagawa, Chief Operating Officer and Senior Vice President, provided an overview of UCI Health’s mission and programs, and its new medical campus in Irvine.

City Council discussion included: noting differences between the new facility and traditional medical campuses, Irvine-specific signage, the site’s patient focus, and the facility’s all-electric power.

By consensus, received and filed.

PUBLIC COMMENTS - NON-AGENDIZED ITEMS

Keon Maluia, on behalf of Congressman Mike Levin, spoke in support of next steps related to the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS) and invited Irvine stakeholders to join the existing SONGS task force.

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the Irvine CONNECT survey as presented.

Allison Walter spoke in support of commencing negotiations to extend the University Park Library lease in order to prevent a library service gap prior to the construction of a new facility.

Crit provided a dog park update, and expressed concerns regarding community message board use and parking lot safety.

Scott Perley, Irvine resident, spoke in support of identification of a problem, goals, measures for evaluation, and requested clarification as to why the responsibility for correcting the perceived problem addressed by the proposed Office of Inclusive Excellence (OIE) should not be assigned to the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Advisory Committee.

Joanne Slobodien spoke in support of securing and honoring the Oak Creek easement, a clear and transparent ballot measure focused on Oak Creek, and adoption of a nitrous oxide ordinance; and questioned the status of the Oak Creek easement.

Ron Galasso, Irvine resident, spoke in support of hosting a proof-of-concept workshop by Veterans Advancing Leadership Opportunities and Resources (VALOR), a mentorship program targeting 18- to 25-year-old individuals, with the City and Irvine Valley College; and in support of the scheduling of a VALOR program presentation to the Mayor, City Council and Chief Kent.

Alan Meyerson, Irvine resident, noted his enjoyment of the recently concluded season at Great Park Live and spoke in support of converting the venue into a permanent facility.

David Lingerfelt, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the lack of meaningful outreach and consultation with residents related to Great Park projects, and in support of engagement with a neighborhood club formed by Great Park residents.

Jack Walker spoke in opposition to the characterization of City Council discussion related to the proposed Office of Inclusive Excellence (OIE) in the minutes of a previous meeting, and in opposition to the establishment of an OIE.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident, Orange County Power Authority (OCPA) Community Advisory Committee Member, and Community & Library Services Commissioner, noted OCPA's clean independent audit report and provided an update on the Community Power Program.

Jason Garshfield, Irvine resident, spoke in support of increased measures to address electric bicycle (e-bike) safety and in opposition to the punitive tone displayed toward teenage e-bike riders at a recent City Council meeting.

Benjamin Rausch spoke in support of the City's proposed investment in LGBTQIA+ programming at the Center for Healthy Living.

Claire Chong, Portola High School student, spoke in support of encouraging individual action to transition from single-use plastics to reusable bottles, containers, and utensils. Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the inconsistency between Mayor Agran's previous promotion of kindness and previous City recognition of the Orange County Turkish American Association.

Tomas Castro, Irvine resident, expressed appreciation to the City Council for rescinding its notice of intent to withdraw from OCPA and spoke in opposition to the potential for the agendizing of a special City Council meeting related to the agency.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the level of traffic gridlock in the City due to the continued approval of new developments without first fixing existing infrastructure.

Ankur Parikh, Irvine resident and Woodbridge High School student, spoke in support of the City's continued membership in OCPA.

Prakash, Irvine resident, noted special taxes paid by Great Park residents, Cultural Terrace financial commitments, and the current budget shortfall for Great Park projects; and spoke in support of considering measures to address the budget shortfall by the City Council or a subset, and engagement with Great Park residents in the new year.

CITY MANAGERS REPORT

Michael Kent, Director of Public Safety/Chief of Police, noted that there had been no recent immigration enforcement activity in the City since the last update.

Chris Slama, Director of Community & Library Services, provided brief updates regarding the upcoming reopenings of the Katie Wheeler Library and the TRIPS Program.

City Manager Crumby reported that Irvine Company provided the City with an irrevocable offer of dedication related to the open space easement in Oak Creek, the first step in recordation of that easement, which was anticipated to take place later that week.

6. COUNCIL BUSINESS

6.6 CITY COUNCIL REORGANIZATION - SELECTION OF VICE MAYOR AND INTERIM MAYOR

Mayor Agran opened the floor for nominations for the selection of Vice Mayor for the ensuing year.

Councilmember Treseder nominated Councilmember Mai to be re-appointed as Vice Mayor for the ensuing year.

Councilmember Liu nominated Councilmember Treseder to serve as Vice Mayor for the ensuing year; however, Councilmember Treseder declined the nomination.

There were no other nominations.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to reappointing Councilmember Mai and in support of selecting Councilmember Carroll as Vice Mayor for the ensuing year.

Jason Garshfield, Irvine resident, spoke in support of the reappointing Councilmember Mai as Vice Mayor for the ensuing year and seating him next to the Mayor if appointed to that position.

City Council discussion included: noting concerns regarding succession planning now that the City has transitioned to district elections.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Agran, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, and unanimously carried to close the nomination period.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Mayor Agran, and unanimously carried to select Councilmember Mai to continue to serve as Vice Mayor for the ensuing year*.

** Councilmember Liu abstained; however, pursuant to Section 1-2-311(G) of the Municipal Code, "Except as otherwise provided by law, no member of the City Council shall be permitted to abstain from voting unless such disqualification shall have been approved by the City Attorney or by unanimous vote of the remainder of the Council present. Unapproved disqualifications and abstentions shall be recorded by the City Clerk as an affirmative vote." As such, Councilmember Liu's unapproved abstention was recorded as an affirmative vote.*

5.1 **GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT, ZONE CHANGE, AMENDMENT TO A DENSITY BONUS AGREEMENT, WITH AN ASSOCIATED PROPERTY EXCHANGE TRANSACTION BETWEEN HERITAGE FIELDS EL TORO AND THE CITY OF IRVINE FOR LAND WITHIN PLANNING AREA 51 (GREAT PARK)**

Mayor Agran opened the public hearing at 6:38 p.m.

Stephanie Frady, Director of Community Development, and Pete Carmichael, Assistant City Manager, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Jeff Melching, City Attorney, also responded to questions.

Kory Lynch, representing applicant Heritage Fields El Toro, expressed appreciation to City staff for their collaboration and responded to questions.

Don Geller, Irvine resident and Finance Commission Chair, spoke in support of Finance Commission review of the matter and of the proposal as presented.

Raj Bhatia, Irvine resident and Planning Commission Vice Chair, spoke in support of adhering to the Great Park Framework Plan, a main library, veterans' resource center, transit connectivity, and amenities for all families at the Great Park; and in support of a vote by the City Council on the columbarium.

City Council discussion included: providing a historical background and associated legal requirements related to zoning; inquired about City exemptions on zoning matters at the ARDA site; discussed potential conflicts related to ballot initiatives; questioned whether a library qualified as a government use, a mandate, or permissible use; questioned whether the proposed columbarium or veterans resource center required voter approval; and inquired about Heritage Fields El Toro’s (HFET) position on how HFET’s \$15 million contribution would be spent.

Mayor Agran reconvened the City Council meeting at 9:25 p.m.

5. PUBLIC HEARINGS (CONTINUED)

5.1 GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT, ZONE CHANGE, AMENDMENT TO A DENSITY BONUS AGREEMENT, WITH AN ASSOCIATED PROPERTY EXCHANGE TRANSACTION BETWEEN HERITAGE FIELDS EL TORO AND THE CITY OF IRVINE FOR LAND WITHIN PLANNING AREA 51 (GREAT PARK)

Additional City Council discussion included: referencing the Gypsum Canyon veterans cemetery proposal; discussed the need for housing, including affordable housing, and a library; suggested fundraising for a columbarium at an alternative location within the City; suggested continuing discussion and consideration of the item to January 2026 to allow additional time for assessment; and questioned whether a columbarium at another Great Park location would be permissible.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Agran, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, and unanimously carried to close the public hearing at 9:26 p.m.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Liu, seconded by Councilmember Go, to:

Approve and authorize City Manager to sign Affordable Housing and Necessary Government Use Property Exchange Agreement between City of Irvine and Heritage Fields El Toro, LLC, subject to the following revisions to Sections 3.i.i.A and 3.i.ii:

- 1) Prohibit expenditure of any portion of the \$15 million provided by those sections on the design or development of a columbarium.
- 2) Allow expenditures of those funds on the planning and development of a library anywhere in the Great Park, including on the ARDA Transfer Site.

Following discussion, Councilmember Liu clarified her motion.

6.1 CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY COUNCILMEMBER CARROLL TO DISCUSS THE CLOSURE OF IRVINE'S HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE FACILITY

This item was agendized at the request of Councilmember Carroll, who asked for City Council consideration to discuss the closure of Irvine's household hazardous waste facility.

Sean Crumby, City Manager, reported that the lease for the current facility was extended through the end of 2026, and responded to questions.

The following individuals spoke in support of extending the lease for the household hazardous waste facility until an alternative location was identified in the City:

- Joanne Slobodien
- Alan Meyerson, Irvine resident
- Harvey Liss, Irvine resident

Heidi noted the unlawfulness of the lease extension for Irvine's household hazardous waste facility and spoke in support of transparency and resident involvement in the process of site selection.

Jay B. noted the events leading up to the initial lease termination; and questioned the rationale for the City not reaching an agreement with the County before the City's initial lease termination and whether the dog park expansion was approved by the City Council.

Eric Neshanian, Irvine resident, spoke in support of keeping a household hazardous waste facility in the City.

City Council discussion included: noting the importance of proper disposal of hazardous waste; and questioned whether the City had already sent a letter allowing an extension, and if so, if the County was in agreement.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Carroll, seconded by Mayor Agran, and unanimously carried to:

Ratify the extension of the lease for Irvine's household hazardous waste facility through the end of 2026.

Following consideration of Council Business Item No. 6.1, Mayor Agran suggested reordering the agenda to consider Council Business Item No. 6.3 prior to Council Business Item No. 6.2. With Vice Mayor Mai's concurrence and consensus of the City Council, the agenda was reordered as suggested.

6.3 *CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST BY MAYOR AGRAN TO DISCUSS NEXT STEPS FOLLOWING THE SEPTEMBER 30, 2025 STUDY SESSION ON SPENT NUCLEAR FUEL AT THE SAN ONOFRE NUCLEAR GENERATING STATION*

This item was agendaized at the request of Mayor Agran, who asked for City Council consideration to discuss next steps following the September 30, 2025, study session on spent nuclear fuel at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station (SONGS).

Sean Crumby, City Manager, and Jeff Melching, City Attorney, responded to questions.

Susan Sayre, Irvine resident, expressed concern regarding nuclear waste; spoke in opposition to moving the spent nuclear fuel to a local above-ground location; and questioned storage facility locations, security measures, and transportation methods for spent fuel containers.

Dan Stetson, Irvine resident and Chair of the Community Engagement Panel for the Decommissioning of SONGS, spoke in support of the City joining and becoming active in the Spent Fuel Solutions Coalition, adopting a resolution supporting safe removal of spent nuclear fuel, taking an active role in Congressman Levin's Spent Nuclear Fuel Task Force, and assisting with recruitment of members of Congress to join the bipartisan Spent Nuclear Fuel Solutions Caucus.

Manuel Camargo, Principal Manager for Strategic Planning at Southern California Edison and SONGS, spoke in support of relocating spent nuclear fuel to an off-site location and partnering with the City to hold the Department of Energy and federal government to their legal and contractual obligations.

Alan Meyerson, Irvine resident, noted the urgency of the need for a prompt solution to the issue of spent nuclear fuel located within such close proximity to the City.

Harvey Liss, Irvine resident, spoke in support of placing spent nuclear fuel into safer containers and transporting them to fortified storage facilities.

Dave Rice, South Orange County resident and United Nations Association of Orange County President, spoke in support of the City taking a leadership role in developing a "Plan B" for spent nuclear fuel at SONGS in the event that the federal government does not fulfill its obligations.

David Richardson, Associate Dean of Research and Professor of Environmental and Occupational Health at the University of California, Irvine (UCI), spoke in support of next steps, and offered his scientific assistance and expertise with identifying technical experts and resources.

Cameron Cosgrove, San Clemente resident and former Irvine City Councilmember and Commissioner, spoke in support of local government leadership in developing solutions and putting pressure on the federal government related to spent nuclear fuel at SONGS.

Haakon Williams, Executive Director of Committee to Bridge the Gap, and Nadia Khawja, on behalf of the Samuel Lawrence Foundation, spoke in support of safe storage of spent nuclear fuel and its transportation to a fortified facility.

Gary Headrick, representing San Clemente Green, spoke in support of the City taking on a leadership role in exploring the cost, scope, and timetable for pursuing the relocation of spent nuclear fuel to a safer location.

City Council discussion included: suggesting the City assume a leadership role and join existing efforts with other organizations and coalitions; inquired about a cost estimate; questioned the rationale for the closure of the Yucca Mountain Nuclear Waste Repository and Nuclear Regulatory Commission leadership; suggested seeking potential assistance from experts at the University of California, Irvine (UCI); noted the City's prior leadership role in environmental matters; and noted the membership of some UCI experts on Congressman Levin's task force.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Agran, seconded by Councilmember Carroll, to:

Direct the City Manager to preliminarily establish a multi-disciplinary SONGS storage planning team and return to the City Council by February 24, 2026, with the proposed team roster, a succinct scope of work and schedule, and funding recommendations.

ACTION: A friendly amendment was made by Councilmember Liu, accepted by Mayor Agran as the maker and Councilmember Carroll as seconder, to:

- 1) Direct the City to join the Spent Fuel Solutions Coalition.
- 2) Direct the City Manager to preliminarily establish a multi-disciplinary SONGS storage planning team and return to the City Council by February 24, 2026, with the proposed team roster, a succinct scope of work and schedule, and funding recommendations.

ACTION: A substitute motion was made by Councilmember Treseder, seconded by Councilmember Liu, to:

- 1) Direct that the City join the Spent Fuel Solutions Coalition, and become an active member among 300 members in 11 states.
- 2) Direct staff to draft a resolution supporting the safe removal of spent nuclear fuel.
- 3) Direct that the City take an active role on Congressman Levin's Spent Nuclear Fuel Task Force, including the appointment of an Irvine councilmember if Congressman Levin agrees.
- 4) Assist with the recruitment of members of Congress to join the bipartisan Spent Nuclear Fuel Solutions Caucus.

Melissa Haley, Director of Communications & Engagement, presented the staff report and responded to questions. Karena Lee, Public Engagement Strategist, was also available for questions. Jeff Melching, City Attorney, also responded to questions.

Doug Elliott, Irvine resident and Community & Library Services Commissioner, spoke in support of holding the 2026 Independence Day Celebration on July 3 and suggested a program devoted to the meaning of the occasion such as a documentary screening followed by a discussion with history professors.

Sean Sutton, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer for Pacific Symphony, noted the symphony's 30-year tradition of holding a July 4th concert, the opportunity for a two-day celebration over a weekend, and the symphony's willingness to work with the City regardless of the approved date for the celebration.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in support of canceling the 2026 Independence Day Celebration due to associated costs, and in opposition to holding the event on July 4.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about the potential to secure sponsorships; noted the need for fiscal responsibility; questioned the costs of holding the event on July 3 in comparison to July 4 and the potential impact on securing sponsorships; inquired about the City incurring costs for Pacific Symphony events; questioned whether Pacific Symphony assumed the costs associated with its events; inquired about steps to improve ingress and egress in the Great Park; suggested drone show reductions; discussed intrinsic and extrinsic interests; noted impacts and liability exposure from last year's event; inquired about the possibility of donating funds to the Woodbridge Village Association (WVA) for its Independence Day event; suggested the elimination of an

annual event and spreading out multiple events in lieu of; and discussed agendizing the matter at a City Council meeting in January 2026.

ACTION: Moved by Mayor Agran, seconded by Councilmember Martinez Franco, to:

Direct staff to suspend any and all exploration of holding an Independence Day event on July 3 or July 4, 2026, at the Great Park, and return to the City Council in January 2026 with alternatives within a \$250,000 budget.

Melissa Haley, Director of Communications & Engagement, provided a brief overview of a request received by the Asian American Museum of Orange County to host a Lunar New Year parade and festival at the Great Park on February 7, 2026. Cory Hilderbrand, Community & Library Services Manager, also responded to questions.

Jack Toan and Yulan Chung, representing the Asian American History Museum of Orange County, provided additional background information, and spoke in support of a City-wide Lunar New Year event.

Dee Fox, Irvine resident, spoke in opposition to the establishment of a City-wide Lunar New Year event.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about costs associated with the event; inquired about rent costs for Great Park Live; questioned similar concessions for other cultural events; and clarified the City's role as event facilitator and not host of the event.

ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Liu, seconded by Councilmember Treseder, and unanimously carried to:

Direct the City Manager and staff to facilitate, in collaboration with local stakeholders, the creation of a Lunar New Year celebration that reflects the City's diverse population and cultural heritage, with the City's contribution not to exceed \$50,000; and direct staff to return to the City Council on January 13, 2026, for review and approval of the event plan and budget.
