### CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Irvine City Council was called to order at 4:06 p.m. on November 10, 2020, in the City Council Chamber, Irvine Civic Center, One Civic Center Plaza, Irvine, California; Mayor Shea presiding.

Mayor Shea announced that the meeting was broadcast live on Cox Communications Local Access Channel 30 and AT&T U-Verse Channel 99, and livestreamed online at [cityofirvine.org](http://cityofirvine.org); and that in an effort to protect public health and prevent the spread of COVID-19, the e-comment feature had been extended for all agenda items, which allowed members of the public the ability to submit e-comments through the public comment portion of each item and would be included as part of the official record and uploaded to the City's website. She also assured the community that the City of Irvine was adhering to the Governor's Executive Order in the Council Chamber and throughout City Hall by sanitizing surfaces and equipment, as well as wearing face masks.

Mayor Shea also announced that general public comments for the City Council on items not on the agenda would be considered at approximately 6:30 p.m., which had been standard practice prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, and expressed her appreciation for everyone's patience and understanding as the City continued to make adjustments to meeting protocols as needed.

Mayor Shea further noted that following the Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation, Vice Mayor Carroll would be presiding over the meeting as she would be participating in a required conference call.

## **1. PRESENTATIONS**

### **1.1 *Silverado Fire Update and Adoption of a Resolution Declaring Termination of the Silverado Fire Emergency***

Mike Hamel, Director of Public Safety/Chief of Police, Shane Sherwood, Orange County Fire Authority Division Chief, and Casey Gnadl, Open Space Administrator, provided an update on the Silverado Fire and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: noting the successfulness of the evacuation through multi-agency cooperation; expressed appreciation for efficient and timely updates provided during the fires; inquired about how residents could assist with landscaping lost due to the fire; and expressed condolences to the firefighters injured during the fire.

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that the following e-comments had been received:

- Emily Liu, who expressed concern about All American Asphalt and suggested the City return to holistic grazing.
- Cherry Lai, who expressed appreciation to the Orange County Fire Authority and Irvine Police Department, and noted confusion with the evacuation map.

**1.2 Community Choice Energy Update**

Mark Steuer, Director of Public Works and Transportation, Ryan Baron, Best Best and Krieger, and Gary Saleba, EES Consulting, provided the update and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: inquiring about concerns raised by other cities; questioned the difference in governance related to two board seats and the alternative weighted vote options; expressed concern about liabilities and associated impacts to Irvine; inquired about the source of the \$2.5 million loan and related terms; requested clarity on the member withdrawal process; expressed concern about the potential lack of financial investments from other participating cities; and questioned next steps to move forward with the Joint Powers Authority (JPA) Agreement.

Jeff Melching, City Attorney, clarified deal points included in the JPA agreement.

**ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Khan, seconded by Councilmember Fox, to:**

- 1) Direct staff to complete negotiations with other participating cities and approve the JPA Agreement including the following modifications:
  - A capital loan of \$250,000 in the first tranche, up to \$2.5 million for start-up costs, and collateral for the power purchase loan with an eight (8) year contemplated term.
  - Governance: Two (2) votes for the City of Irvine until the capital loan is repaid, and the alternative weighted vote would continue on in perpetuity.
  - No penalty for exit prior to March 2021
  - Clarity on the member withdrawal process
  - Four year term of office
  - An Executive Committee of Founding Members
  - Meetings can occur with a quorum
  - Special voting does not require affirmative vote of Irvine directors
  - A Statement regarding ratepayer equity
- 2) Provide City staff and outside counsel the authority to make such other modifications that are consistent with City Council direction.
- 3) Grant authority to the City Manager to sign the agreement once fully approved.

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that an e-comment had been received from Anonymous Resident, who expressed concern over the lack of housing funds and allocations to affordable housing, and inquired about an update on the Mayor and Vice Mayor's appeal regarding the amount of livable land and protections of open space.

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that e-comments had been received from the following:

- Anonymous Resident, who expressed support for the submittal of the application, as well as the Native Spring project and the wonderful addition it would be to the City with the greatest number of affordable housing units in Orange County.
- Jonathan Beer, who expressed support of using the funds to make Irvine more affordable.

**2.6 ACCEPTANCE OF AWARD FROM THE COUNTY OF ORANGE FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE SCHOOL MOBILE ASSESSMENT RESOURCE TEAM (SMART)**

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that an e-comment had been received from Anonymous Resident, who expressed concern about Councilmember-Elect Kim not being present for the vote on this item, but that participation in this pilot program would serve the City and schools well; and asked if Lieutenant Klug could comment on how the program was different from School Resource Officers and the DARE program.

Police Chief Mike Hamell and Lt. Dave Klug provided a brief overview of the program and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning whether SMART support was limited to physical threats; and inquired about whether the City would lose the ability to deploy one full-time officer; and questioned how much time the full-time officer would spend outside of the City.

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that e-comments had been received from the following individuals:

Charles Kovac, Housing Administrator, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

Kevin Trussell, Community Services Chair, spoke in support, noting the criteria used to evaluate organizations.

City Council discussion included: questioning the mechanism used to provide how funding was used for residents and others within the City limits; and requested a follow-up presentation at a future Council meeting.

Pete Pirzadeh, Pirzadeh & Associates, spoke in support of the zone change, and responded to questions related to traffic improvements.

City Council discussion included: expressing support for the open space concept; inquired about the intensity and rezoning of the project; expressed concern about associated traffic impacts and whether traffic improvements were included as part of the development; requested clarification between trip monitoring and trip allocation; inquired about access on the Walnut Avenue side of the project; and expressed a preference to hire locally with respect to construction jobs.

**4.2 REVIEW RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE STRATEGIC ENERGY PLAN**

Sona Coffee, Environmental Programs Administrator, presented the staff report and responded to questions.

City Council discussion included: questioning cost reduction measures and savings and why energy savings were not higher; encouraged telecommuting for environmental sustainability and energy cost savings; suggested the use of Tesla batteries to help with energy savings at City Hall; questioned desired outcomes from the Strategic Energy Plan; inquired about the use of solar panels in parking lots; questioned whether older City facilities have been upgraded with energy efficient material; and expressed support of exploring ways to incentivize homeowners and reduce barriers related to energy efficient upgrades.

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that the following e-comments had been received:

  - Suvan Geer, Santa Ana resident, spoke in favor of the plan and suggested including stakeholders representatives of the non-English speaking community as well as members of indigenous tribes.

**ACTION: Moved by Councilmember Khan, seconded by Mayor Shea, and unanimously carried to:**

Approve the scope of work in the Climate Action and Adaptation Plan and direct staff to issue a Request for Proposals.

**PUBLIC COMMENTS**

Carl Petersen, Assistant City Clerk, noted that the following e-comments had been received:

- DD Fox, Irvine resident, who expressed opposition to false statements by Dee Fox via social media, her complaints filed with the FPPC and other entities.

- Jeff Lee, and Lori Landi, who expressed concern over the lack of action by the City Council in addressing issues related to All American Asphalt.
- Dave McCarthy; Beth Griffen; Jim Blum; Private Citizen; and Dee Fox, Irvine resident, who expressed opposition to Vice Mayor Carroll’s use of taxpayer money for personal advertising.
- Anonymous Resident, who expressed gratitude to Mayor Shea, Vice Mayor Carroll, and Councilmember Fox for their leadership over the past several years and acknowledged Mayor Shea for conceding with grace and class.
- Irvine Company, who asked, “Now what do we do?”
- Alex Lee, who expressed support for Councilmember Khan’s successful election to Mayor.
- Kim Konte, Irvine resident, who expressed concern about exposure to toxic emissions, and suggested that the City Council work with UC Irvine advisors to collect air samples and baseline data on how emissions are impacting neighborhoods and schools.
- Jillian Dale, who expressed concerns over the consultants hired to assess impact created by All American Asphalt, and suggested the City consult with UC Irvine.
- Cherry Lai, who expressed support for the City Council calling for unity and human decency as Irvine moves forward toward a better and brighter future.
- Keating Thompson, who expressed opposition to emissions related to All American Asphalt.
- Pamela Wykoff, who spoke in support of Mayor Shea, and thanked her on her handling of Covid-19, support for law enforcement, and the family unit.
- Jonathan Beer, who congratulated Councilmember Khan on her election to Mayor.
